PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

With the removal of the classroom trailers and the installation of the new track, the Abingdon Elementary expansion and renovation project is nearing comple-

tion. We're optimistic that by year-end, students and the community will again have access to the field.

Inside, the renovation work is also almost done, and students respond enthusiastically when asked about the changes, particularly the new three-story classroom addition. The building's exterior, with brick work that complements that of Fairlington, combines both traditional and modern touches that fit nicely with the neighborhood's historic character.

Every major construction project has its disruptions. But the number of complaints has been remarkably small. This is a tribute both to the patience and understanding of nearby residents and to the vigilant oversight by Arlington Public Schools (APS) and the construction contractor management team.

FCA and the Fairlington Villages condo association worked closely with APS to keep the community informed on major construction activities and to provide a way for residents to raise concerns. The APS management staff were engaged and responsive. Throughout the process the school board was supportive.

Abingdon Elementary is an important part of our community. Dozens of our families have children enrolled there, while a number of Abingdon faculty and staff live in Fairlington. For several years, most of the school's PTA leadership has come from Fairlington.

Abingdon displays key factors for success:

- It offers a strong and innovative instructional curriculum, from the artsoriented Project GIFT and its partnership with the Kennedy Center to the pervasive use of technology to a pioneering elementary architecture class.
- It enjoys a dedicated corps of parents who ensure that all students are supported, often raising funds to enrich classroom offerings or provide additional resources for low-income families or students from other cultures.
- It is woven into the life of the neighborhood through things like the spring Fairlington 5K, which brings out hundreds of residents, and the annual Halloween parade, which this year featured the Petite Presidents (see pages 19 and 25).

Those of us who don't have kids at Abingdon understand the value the school plays in Fairlington—through the vibrant presence of young people in the neighborhood, the emphasis on quality education, and the strengthened sense of community. Ultimately, this yields higher property values. Abingdon—and its Fairlington families—is one of our community's great assets.

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ACPD discusses recent sexual assault in Shirlington

Capt. Adrienne Quigley, Commander of Arlington County Police Department's (ACPD) Third District, and her colleagues joined FCA's November meeting to brief residents on a recent sexual assault in Shirlington.

The crime took place at 10:41 pm on Thursday, November 2, near the intersection of S. Randolph St. and S. 31st St. The woman reporting the crime was attacked from behind while loading her car. Police were

dispatched to the area to respond to reports of a rape. The assailant, described as a tall, thin, black male in his 20s, fled the scene, and though pursued, remains at large.

Arlington police are now gathering information from residents and local businesses to identify and apprehend the suspect in question. They ask residents to report anything they may have seen related to the case, and to remain vigilant over the next few weeks. The ACPD has been in contact with The Citizen and Shirlington House apartments to ensure residents are aware of the crime. They are also using social media platforms to get the word out to others in the county.

Capt. Quigley noted the department is stepping up plainclothes patrols and examining lighting in the area to maximize safety. The police are working with Arlington County to repair street lights where needed, and initiate tree trimming where leaves may impede lighting. They plan to meet with The Citizen, the apartment complex near the scene of the crime, to see what the owner can do to improve the safety of the property.

The shopping-filled weeks between Thanksgiving and Christmas, known as "robbery season" by police, often bring an uptick in crime. Capt. Quigley emphasized staying alert when out after dark, and encouraged residents, "Get you and your packages into the car at the same time." Police also encouraged those in the audience to keep an eye out for packages, as

other parts of Arlington County have received reports of stolen deliveries.

Capt. Quigley noted that while the recent assault is a terrible instance, Fairlington-Shirlington is still a safe area. When asked by residents what they can do to remain safe while out at night, she recommended parking in well-lit areas, staying with a group if possible, and staying off cell phones to ensure awareness of personal space and surroundings.

Safety improvements on S. 31st St.

Lighting improvements on S. 31st St. from S. Woodrow St. to S. Randolph St. are slated for 2019 as part of the county's Neighborhood Conservation program. The project would replace the existing Cobra lights with Carlyle lights, improving lighting along the street.

FCA recommended this project to the county's Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee in October 2016, the committee endorsed it in December 2016, and the county board approved it in February.

The package of improvements includes installation of a sidewalk along the east side of S. 31st St., from the bus shelter across from the Shirlington House apartments to S. Randolph St.



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Vihstadt addresses county and neighborhood issues

County Board Member John Vihstadt led a wideranging discussion of issues impacting Arlington and Fairlington residents at the November FCA meeting. Topics spanned the county budgeting process, economic development and planning, transportation and infrastructure, and population growth. In many of these areas, Vihstadt emphasized the value the county places on citizen engage-

ment. Below you'll find a summary of the issues that Vihstadt addressed.

The county budget

The board is about to enter its budgeting process to determine the budget for fiscal year 2019. Arlington's annual budget is about \$1.3 billion. Last year, the county raised property taxes by 1.5 cents, which it dedicated to Metro and public-school funding. Vihstadt noted that the board does not like raising taxes, but some of the funding decisions, like those for public education, are critical for maintaining Arlington's competitiveness as an attractive location for businesses and residents.

This year, the County Manager initiated early roundtable discussions to engage residents in the budget process. The board will give guidance to the County Manager at its November meeting, and the manager will then unveil the proposed budget in February. From that point, it will take about two months to finalize.



South Fairlington resident (and county board member) Libby Garvey also attended the November meeting and talked with FCA Vice President Jonathan Ansley after the session.

In response to an audience question about increased funding for the Neighborhood Conservation Program, a program that funds neighborhood improvement projects, Vihstadt noted some past problems he'd seen in the program, including cost overruns, poor contractor work, and trouble securing contractors. He noted that the County Manager is reviewing how to increase efficiency in the program. He noted that Fairlington has done a good job engaging the community on proposed projects, but in other neighborhoods, residents aren't consulted and didn't support some projects.

Vihstadt briefly discussed the planned renovation of Fairlington Park at the Fairlington Community Center. One resident noted that the county's parks and recreation department comes up with a budget first, then engages neighborhoods, and he thought that the process should be reversed. Vihstadt says that the Department of Parks and Recreation wrestles with this issue, but that they are trying to ensure projects are cost-effective and not "gold-plated."

Next, Arlington will look at updating its Capital Improvement Plan, a process that occurs every two years.

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FCA elections to be held at December meeting

Elections for the 2018 Fairlington Citizens Association (FCA) Board of Directors will be held at the annual meeting on Wednesday, December 13, at 7 pm at the Fairlington Community Center, 3308 S. Stafford St.

Board members are elected at the annual meeting and hold office for a term of one year or until their successors are elected. All of the nine positions are up for election each year. Eight of the nine current board members have indicated their candidacy for the 2018 board.

A few recent issues that the FCA has been tracking include the I-395 express lanes and sound walls, the Alexandria Gateway development, and street improvements. It has hosted activities like the home remodeling seminars, the first-ever Fairlington movie night, and Santa on the Firetruck coming up this month.

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Affordable housing developer to acquire Park Shirlington

An affordable housing development group is slated to purchase the Park Shirlington apartments on S. 31st St., with plans to maintain the property as workforce and affordable housing. The sale is expected to close in early December.

The purchaser is Standard Property Company, a multifamily real estate investment and management firm specializing in affordable housing, in partnership with the National Foundation for Affordable Housing Solutions. Arlington County is also expected to participate in financing the acquisition through a loan from the Arlington Housing Investment Fund.

Representatives of the purchaser team briefed the FCA Board on their plans in November. Noting that the current owner of the property (Home Properties, Inc.) was nationally marketing Park Shirlington to other developers, Joe Oullette, a principal at Standard Property Company, said that the purchase was designed to take the property off the market and maintain it as workforce and affordable housing.

Oullette said that detailed plans for the property had not yet been developed but that the general plan was to retain the existing buildings and "sprinkle in" additional units.

The Arlington Housing Commission approved the financing package on November 9. The Arlington County Board was tentatively scheduled to consider the proposed acquisition on November 28.

In 2013, Home Properties proposed to replace the existing 294 apartments with 750 new apartments in five buildings that would be three- to five-stories high, with most of the units being market rate with rents competitive with others in Shirlington.

These plans were put on indefinite hold in 2014 when Home Properties announced a change in its business strategy, exiting the new development business in order to concentrate on acquiring and upgrading older properties.

FCA expects to schedule a briefing for the community on Park Shirlington plans in the spring.

Election day in Fairlington

A cold, damp, Tuesday did not keep Fairlington voters away from the polls as they cast ballots in last month's general election. Fairlington residents vote in two locations, the Fairlington Community Center ("Fairlington," precinct 12), and the North Fairlington Community Center ("Abingdon," precinct 22).

Voter turnout was up at both precincts from the 2013 gubernatorial race. The Fairlington precinct saw a 16.8 percent increase in voter turnout, while the Abingdon precinct saw an 18.9 percent

voter increase. Given the strong turnout, lines fluctuated during prime voting hours in the morning and late afternoon.

In voting results, the two Fairlington precincts generally followed patterns throughout the county and emulated the county's strong support of Democratic candidates. According to unofficial returns from the Virginia Department of Elections, Ralph Northam heavily carried both precincts. Fairlington's Abingdon precinct went for

Northam with 79.8 percent, while his totals dropped off a bit in South Fairlington, to 76.9 percent. Countywide, Northam received 80.1 percent of the vote to Ed Gillespie's 18.9 percent.

In the races for lieutenant governor and attorney general, both Democratic candidates won the county by just under 80 percent. Justin Fairfax garnered 66,687 votes in Arlington in the race for lieutenant governor, ahead of state Sen. Jill Vogel's 17,594. Attorney General Mark Herring

was re-elected with 67,111 votes, ahead of John Adams' 17,366 votes.

Locally, Erik Gutshall won the race for Arlington County Board, while Monique O'Grady claimed victory for the Arlington County School Board seat. Gutshall will be Chair Jay Fisette's successor, as Fisette did not seek reelection after 20 years on the board. O'Grady will take the seat of incumbent James Lander.

Economic development and planning

Vihstadt gave a fairly detailed overview of economic development challenges and efforts in the county. He said that the main challenge for county officials is balancing residential and commercial tax assessments, which have to be the same rate under Virginia law. The county has been struggling with a higher commercial vacancy rate, which means that it leans more on residential property taxes. In order to raise revenue, the county has to look at raising taxes or cutting spending, both of which present challenges.

The county is making efforts to attract a variety of employers, including trade associations, large and small businesses, and non-profits. For example, Nestle USA is moving to Rosslyn and will add 750 jobs to the county at an average salary of \$100,000 per year.

Modern workplace changes, however, continue to drive down the need for commercial space—employers are leasing less space for the same number of employees because of a trend towards assigning employees smaller office space and allowing remote work. In addition, Arlington is surrounded by highly competitive neighbors, as the D.C. metro area has ramped up development and the Silver Line has made other surrounding areas appealing to employers.

In the planning process, the county is currently working with the community on two significant projects. As Fairlingtonians may already be aware, the county is examining possible improvements to the Four Mile Run Valley in Shirlington. This area is one of the few remaining in the county that is zoned for light industrial, and Vihstadt noted that the businesses there provide many useful services, such as auto repairs and pet care. It also

contains a variety of county parks and arts facilities. Vihstadt noted that the county will not touch the dog park after hearing from the community.

The other planning process involves Lee Highway improvements, and the county is considering whether anything should be done to update aging strip malls along that corridor. It's also considering adding affordable and market-rate housing at commercial centers, and improving the streetscape to make it more pedestrian-friendly.

Elsewhere in the area, Vihstadt said that there will no longer be a hotel at the Gateway Development in Alexandria at the intersection of Beauregard and King Sts.

Population growth

Fairlington parents with children in public schools are aware of increasing growth in the student body, requiring additional space and school boundary changes. Vihstadt noted that Fairlington is probably isolated from changes to school boundaries because of its geographic location on the edge of the county. And while he understands resistance to boundary changes, he also emphasized that "There are no bad schools in Arlington."

Arlington has several new schools at the elementary and middle school level being built across the county. Of special interest to Fairlington, Abingdon Elementary is entering the last phase of its renovation, and the community will be able to tour the school in late January or early February.


The school system has found ways to increase capacity at its high schools by retrofitting current space,

rather than adding on, but that may not be enough in the long-term. There is consideration being given to whether to plan for a fourth high school at the intersection of Columbia Pike and Walter Reed Dr. Vihstadt noted that the school board and county board are working closely to address these capacity challenges.

The other challenge that comes with population growth is that the county itself needs more land, which is becoming an increasingly prized commodity in an area of only 26 square miles. The county recently added two new tracts to its portfolio: the Buck property near Washington-Lee High School and the former Virginia Hospital Center campus on Carlin Springs Dr.

The Joint Facilities Advisory Commission reviews county facilities and property and advises the county on possible uses. In addition to more space in schools, the county needs space for storing school and ART buses. Vihstadt highlighted the need for more money for land acquisition, but also the need to be creative with limited space.

Transportation and infrastructure

Looking at transportation issues that impact the whole region, Vihstadt would like to see a dedicated funding source for Metro. Even though work has been done to fix Metro's cost inefficiencies, he believes the system fundamentally needs more money. One option for a funding source is a new county sales tax, but that requires General Assembly dispensation, adding another consideration as to how exactly the region improves Metro. Every county with at least one Metro station has to pay in to the system, and Loudon County will be an

additional funder when the Silver Line crosses its border.

Vihstadt sits on the board of the Virginia Association of Counties, and he and a Fairfax County Supervisor joined forces to advocate for dedicated funding. Vihstadt says that he sees more opportunities for working across political divisions at the local level rather than at the state or federal level.

After residents at the meeting raised the issue of street lights that had been out for months, Vihstadt encouraged any resident to email him with the location of non-working lights and offered staff assistance in attempting to expedite repairing the lights. He noted that one challenge with street lights is that they can be owned by VDOT, Dominion Energy, or the county.

Vihstadt also encouraged residents to contact him if they see areas where street parking is not marked, but seems that it should be allowed. The county's public safety and engineering experts may disagree as to whether parking should be allowed, but he said that periodically they do find areas where spaces can be added. In response to a resident comment, Vihstadt agreed that the most recent street paving project in Fairlington did not impact parking as much as the last paving project.

Related to street paving, Vihstadt noted that county residents can visit the county's website and enter an address to see how a street is rated under the Pavement Condition Index. The index rates streets on a scale of 0 to 100 and helps inform paving decisions. When planning paving projects, the county tries to aggregate them geographically so crews are not zig-zagging across the county.

In response to complaints about the pedestrian bridge that connects N. Quaker Ln. to Shirlington over I-395, Vihstadt plans to press VDOT on making improvements. VDOT admits the bridge is an eyesore, but because it is structurally sound, VDOT has no plans to improve the 45-year-old structure. Vihstadt doesn't think this is acceptable given that VDOT has revenue from toll lanes that is supposed to be available for pedestrian projects. He's looking to find ways to incentivize VDOT to make some cosmetic improvements.

Finally, regarding issues near and dear to Fairlington, there are no proposals to close Fire Station 7, nor are there any expected service changes to bus routes that serve Fairlington through 2018.

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Voting continues on I-395 express lane sound walls

A second set of ballots was mailed in early November to North Fairlington residents who would be impacted by sound barriers proposed as part of the I-395 express lanes project. Less than 50 percent of the initial ballots were returned, requiring a second round of balloting. Those receiving ballots have 14 days to return them.

Following the briefing on the sound walls at the October FCA meeting, at which affected residents asked for more information about the impact on the surrounding property, representatives of VDOT and the private contractors working on the project scheduled a special briefing for nearby North Fairlington residents in mid-November.

Ballots for affected units in South Fairlington were scheduled to be mailed in late November, and are to be returned within 21 days. According to Geoff Vetter of AECOM, the private contractor that is coordinating the public outreach on the sound walls, the mailing was delayed due to concerns that the design team was working out in November.

A Draft Noise Impact Decision Report identified the individual units that are "impacted and benefitted." Those units are eligible to vote on whether they want sound barriers. Neither the condo associations nor FCA is eligible to vote. Owner/resident votes count more than owner/non-residents, and both count more than renters.

The proposed walls are 25 feet high and require 10 feet of clear space on either side, which may require VDOT to acquire a small amount of property from adjacent condo associations.

In terms of upcoming project work, the contractor will be setting a temporary barrier on the west shoulder of northbound I-395, demolishing the existing barrier, and then beginning construction of underdrains, duct banks, and the new median barrier. Work will also begin on a previously approved sound wall on southbound I-395 south of Seminary Rd.

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

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ABING School news



Abingdon artists fill the school with dots and leaves

Abingdon students' imaginations and artistic creativity are on display everywhere, thanks to a school-wide art project that has added beautiful installations of student work throughout the school. Art teacher Lauren Muscarella explains that she, fellow art teacher Cathy Stark, and librarian Megan Fatouros collaborated to inspire students with the book, *The Dot*, by Peter H. Reynolds.

"Each grade level learned about a new artist and their style, and viewed some of their artwork to create their very own artist-inspired Dot."

- Pre-K students studied Mark Rothko, learning about color relationships and using a brayer to roll ink onto their Dot.
- Kindergarten students learned about Color Field Painting and used vibrant colors to mimic Morris Lewis' artwork.
- First-graders learned about Henri Matisse—the King of Color and how to draw with scissors to create their own collage.
- Second-graders learned how Yayoi Kusama painted dots in

repetition, sometimes filling entire rooms.

- Third-graders learned about Piet Mondrian's use of primary colors and geometric shapes to create planes of color.
- Fourth-graders viewed Wassily Kandinsky's use of shape and color to create interesting compositions.
- Fifth-graders learned about Josef Albers' use of color relationships and composition to show interactions between colors.

Students also worked on a school-wide leaf project. Pre-K made rubbings of real leaves. Kindergarteners learned the types of lines, drew the lines in crayon, and then painted their leaves. First-graders created patterns with lines and shapes in crayon and then painted their leaves. Second-graders drew the veins of the leaf and created patterns using warm or cool colors in each section.

Third-graders created animal print patterns; fourth-graders created patterns using Zentangle designs; and fifth-graders learned about hues of color to create their Zentangle designs. Art teachers glued each leaf onto a large background paper to create a color wheel installation. The leaf installation will stay up for the remainder of the school year.

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Letter to the Editor

I wanted to give some insights on the proposed sound barriers, from the perspective of someone who previously worked for about 10 years in the field of acoustic engineering.

Decibels, the measurement of sound levels, are on a logarithmic (versus linear) scale. As a result, a doubling (or halving) of sound levels equates to 3 decibels.

The article in the November 2017 *All Fairlington Bulletin* said the sound barriers would cause "only" 5 dB reduction. The word "only" is misleading and misplaced. 5 dB is a considerable reduction from an already reasonable 67 dB. It represents more than a 50 percent reduction in sound levels.

A further clarification that a savvy investigator might want to ask for from the Department of Transportation engineers is whether the decibel levels provided were "A-weighted." A-weighting is the appropriate filter shape that matches the human ear. If their sound levels aren't A-weighted, that indicates they haven't really thought things through. The chances they're not quoting A-weighted decibels is extremely low, however, if they are decent engineers.

Food for thought. Hope this is instructive.





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
