School Board liaison to address FCA in February

Arlington School Board Chair Barbara Kanninen will present at FCA's virtual monthly meeting on February 9. The meeting will be live streamed on FCA's Facebook page and residents can submit questions through the chat function.

Kanninen is the board's liaison to FCA, helping to keep the community informed about school news, updates and opportunities to volunteer. She has served on the school board since 2015. She visited FCA in 2018 and 2020.

The public school system has been a focus of much debate in the last few years as educators and administrators navigate the challenges of a global pan-

demic and virtual learning environments. While schools are now open in 2022, school officials are still working through pandemic related restrictions including quarantine regulations, mask, vaccine and testing requirements.

Some of these priorities may change in the wake of the inauguration of new Governor Glen Youngkin on January 15. Already, Youngkin rescinded the executive order requiring masks in K-12 schools stating that parents should have the right to make their own decisions about the educational environment of their children.

Several counties in Northern Virginia, including Arlington county, have stated their intention to continue to require masks for teachers and students despite the order from the Governor. It remains to be seen whether Virginia parents in these counties will have the right to opt out.

Kanninen is expected to address changes like this as well as present general updates and plans for local schools in the upcoming year. Topics that will most likely be on the agenda for Kanninen at the FCA meeting in February include: include finalizing FCA's 2022 budget, planning for the Fairlington 5K, adopting the 2022 schedule for blood drives, and community conversations on diversity, equity, and inclusion

She is looking forward to connecting with the community.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Black History Month affords the opportunity to reflect on the rich African-American heritage that marks much of the area near Fairlington.

These days it's hard to realize that Black communities once thrived just across the way from present-day Fairlington. Over a hundred years ago, the part of Alexandria that lies along King Street from Quaker Lane to I-395 was home to dozens of Black families, with businesses, schools, and churches serving the Black neighborhood.

Research suggests that the leaders of this community valued education, work, and faith. Many owned property. A number of them worked at the Episcopal High School and the Seminary. In the late 1800s, they established a school for neighborhood children and founded a church. Oakland Baptist Church on King Street continues that legacy today.

Over time these families were displaced—often aided by the City of Alexandria—and the racial and cultural character of the area changed, erasing much of the visible presence of the Black community that had been there.

To the north of Fairlington, Green Valley (often called Nauck), which generally lies across Four Mile Run from Shirlington, is one of the oldest Black communities in Arlington. Its roots predate the civil war, but much of its growth occurred in the early decades of the 20th century, when it became a leading center of Black life in Arlington.

Jennie Dean Park, which serves Green Valley, was once Arlington's only public recreation area for Black families. Named for a freed slave who established the Manassas Industrial School for Colored Youth, the park is in the final stages of getting a major renovation—part of a larger county effort to help keep Green Valley vibrant and competitive.

As this newsletter noted a couple of years ago, Shirlington itself was the site of one of the major lunch-counter demonstrations in Arlington in the 1960s.

FCA is committed to helping enrich our understanding of our area's Black history. But we are also encouraging contemporary community conversations about diversity, equity, and inclusion.

A working group led by FCA Board member Lydia Redway has spent several months reviewing materials that could help facilitate those discussions, including toolkits endorsed by Arlington County or developed by organizations in this area. You can read more about this on page 17. We welcome your participation in these neighborhood conversations.

Arlington public libraries expand hours in 2022

Beginning on January 3, designated Arlington County Public Library locations reopened on Sundays and now stay open until 8 p.m. Monday–Thursday. New hours are listed on the website. The closest library location to Fairlington is Shirlington Branch Library located in the downtown Shirlington area.

Representatives from Shirlington library addressed the FCA board at the annual meeting in December 2021. They shared a summary of their ongoing programs for adults and children and expressed interest in expanding their outreach in the Fairlington community.

Shirlington library is excited to offer its patrons more hours to access in-person services in 2022. They have an extensive browsing collection, holds pickup, board games, American Girl dolls, in-library use newspapers, socially distanced computers, and free Wi-Fi access.

Patrons are welcome to bring a covered drink into the library and browse the stacks or work at one of the many tables throughout the building. The Campbell Room, which seats up to 75 people and is made available daily for quiet study can be reserved by the public for programs and meetings which are free and open to the public. The room includes tables, chairs, and an overhead

FCA plans blood drives for 2022

Based on the community's enthusiastic response to the three neighborhood blood drives FCA has sponsored for the past two years, FCA is crafting a plan to host at least three, and maybe four, blood drives in 2022.

Our partner in our previous blood drives has been Children's National Hospital. They provide the staffing and equipment, while FCA arranges access to the room, Fairlington volunteers help load and unload the equipment, and

FCA and Fairlington Cares provide cookies from Great Harvest Bakery for those individuals who donate blood.

Sara Rasmusson, who lives in nearby Parkfairfax, has taken the lead in facilitating the drives, while FCA Secretary Jennifer Chalmers coordinates the events on behalf of FCA. South Fairlington resident Brooke Schmidt led the first drive in 2020.

Inova Blood Donor Services has also approached FCA

about sponsoring a drive in Fairlington. FCA will be exploring options for one drive to be run by Inova.

Blood supplies in the D.C. area are alarmingly low, in part due to COVID-19. The donations by Fairlington residents were important last year in helping address the need. In 2021 the two Fairlington blood drives donated 30 units of blood for Children's. This will help up to 150 children.

The relationship between FCA and Children's has worked well, and FCA welcomes the chance to continue that partnership.

Although the specific dates have not yet been worked out, we would expect to host a blood drive roughly once a quarter. Specific information will be forthcoming in future issues of the *Bulletin*. We hope you will consider donating blood this year.

Oh Deer! Addressing the population's impact on Arlington's forests

Fairlington has seen its share of white-tailed deer visitors in our forested areas or in our gardens or landscaped areas. Across Arlington, deer are numerous. They are beautiful but they are also doing significant damage to Arlington forests. The following information about the impact of deer in our community is drawn from presentations and articles by Bill Browning (see the Arlington Regional Master Naturalists blog at https://armn.org/blog/ for more).

Impact of deer on a healthy forest

A healthy forest has an understory of vegetation in multiple layers, including plants, seedlings, shrubs, and young trees. This understory provides food and cover for many species of insects, reptiles, amphibians, birds, and mammals. The understory also includes the seedlings and saplings of the canopy trees, which form the future generations of the forest.

Deer, along with these other species, depend on forest to survive. They eat the vegetation and use it for cover.

Natural lands are said to have a certain carrying capacity for deer—that is, the number of deer a piece of forest can support and still sustain itself.

Where there are more deer than the land can support sustainably, deer can do substantial damage.

An adult deer eats 5–7 pounds of vegetation a day, as high as they can reach. This deer browse begins to degrade the understory, and without its understory, a forest cannot regenerate. Birds that build nests near the ground, like the brown thrasher and wood thrush, have no protection from predators and they decline. Insects, reptiles, amphibians, and mammals that rely on all the layers of the understory for food and habitat also decline. Deer who are hungry will eat anything, including nonnative and deer-resistant plants. But they prefer the native plants they evolved with, so they reduce the diversity of native plant species, changing the make-up of plant communities. Invasive plants multiply. In the fall,

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Fort Ward Park features aspects of Black history in nearby Alexandria

In a virtual community briefing in late January, the City of Alexandria outlined potential improvements to Fort Ward Park

on Braddock Road. One of a ring of forts constructed by the Union army as part of the Defenses of Washington during the Civil War, Fort Ward became home to a significant Black community once the war was over.

It suggests the rich Black heritage of a part of Alexandria close to Fairlington.

Projects in Fort Ward Park under consideration by Alexandria include an accessible route to the picnic shelter, accessible parking areas, playground relocation, and the protection and commemoration of cemeteries and interpretive elements.

Respecting the history of Black families in the park area is one of the key components of the city's plans for the park.

The land near union forts such as Fort Ward represented freedom for African-Americans, and many settled near the forts once the war ended. A Black community quickly sprang up at Fort Ward and became known as "The Fort."

Some of the families likely came from the nearby Menokin plantation (source of the name for the street that runs between Fairlington Methodist

and Fairlington Presbyterian Churches).

Before the war, a number of enslaved Blacks served as laborers and domestics at the Virginia Theological Seminary and Episcopal High School. Their numbers grew after the war as other families settled in the area to

provide a wider variety of services. The Fort joined with this larger "Seminary" neighborhood to create a vibrant Black community, where many Black families purchased land and established homes.

Black families and leaders created their own churches and schools and acquired land for burial sites. Blackowned houses dotted the area. Fort Wark Park features aspects of this history, protecting graves of some of The Fort's leading families.

A one-room "Colored School Building at Seminary"—located adjacent to the abandoned fort—was the first public school for African Americans living in this community. Remnants of the tree-lined path that led to the school are visible in the park. After the school closed, the community raised funds to equip a new school on the site of what is now Alexandria City High School.

Several residents of

The Fort established Oakland Baptist Church near the grounds of the old fort. The church cemetery, which is technically not part of the park, is privately owned and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The park surrounds it.

In the 1890s the church moved to its current location at the intersection of Braddock Road and King Street. The original building was destroyed by fire in the 1930s and a new one was built on the same site. The current building underwent major renovation in the late 1990s.

Oakland Baptist Church reflects the continuous role of Black leadership in this part of Alexandria going back to the years right after the Civil War.

Another Black burial ground, the Jackson Cemetery, lies within the park and is the burial site for a number of The Fort residents. The land for the cemetery was purchased in 1884 by a resident of The Fort who was a driver at the Episcopal High School and whose wife was a laundress. Studies have identified graves, but no headstones or grave markers survive.

In the 1950s, the City of Alexandria began purchasing land from owners in The Fort as part of a plan to restore the civil war fort and make the area a park. Some owners willingly sold their property and relocated. Others resisted, and the city condemned their property, displacing the residents and demolishing their homes.

That effectively ended The Fort as a dynamic neighborhood.

In recent years Alexandria has undertaken a number of archeological studies of the park area, discovering the foundations of buildings, grave sites, and artifacts.

The city's current plan seeks to improve accessibility to the park, while protecting and respecting the gravesites of the families who once made this area an important site of Black life in Alexandria.

"Fort Ward Park is home to significant historic and cultural resources, including sacred burial grounds of the families that lived there," declares a statement by the city. "The City of Alexandria recognizes that these sacred places and any other burial sites identified in the future must be protected from disturbance and treated with respect and dignity."

What is companion gardening?

Companion gardening may be a new term for you. It is an old, wellestablished gardening method that is becoming new again. Today, especially in large, industrially managed agriculture, you will find only one crop grown in a field, usually corn. Corn strips nitrogen from the soil so each year fields need larger amounts of fertilizers and pesticides to grow the same crops. What would happen if you grew several types of vegetables together instead of just one?

Native American farm-

ers did just that. Planting multiple crops together made sense to Native people. A quick look at any environment, even a lawn, reveals several kinds of grasses and other green plants. They found that companion gardening minimizes the need for fertilizers or pesticides.

Companion gardening is practiced among the Haudenosaunee (Hoe-den-o-show-knee), the Hidatsa (He-datsa) and Mandan, and the Cherokee. Corn, beans, and squash are grown together in a field. This method is sometimes called a Three Sisters Garden, because just like sisters, the plants support one another.

Soil is never plowed or tilled. Instead it is pulled together into a mound. Corn is the tallest sister and is always planted first. When the corn is as tall as your finger, the second sister, beans, is planted around the corn. The corn supports the beans as they climb the stalk. The beans fix nitrogen in the soil that the corn removes. The last sister, squash, is planted in smaller mounds on either side of the corn. The squash spreads around the corn and bean roots and helps to reduce evaporation.

Tiny, prickly, hairs on the squash stems also keep pests out of the garden. The squash and beans have flowers that attract pollinators.

But wait, there's more. When explorers and others reported on their travels to the New World, one constant was how healthy and well-fed everyone was. This was due to a high protein diet. Meat, be it fish, deer, bison, or turkey, was always on the menu if available. There were lean years, however, when game was hard to

find. Luckily, corn, beans, and squash provide a nutritionally balanced diet without meat.

Besides sustainable farming practices, Native people celebrate a reciprocal relationship with the earth through ceremonies, songs, and dance. These are times to acknowledge what the earth has given and what must be done to maintain this relationship.

How does this apply to your Fairlington garden? Don't be afraid to plant multiple kinds of plants together. Look for smaller or dwarf kinds of vegetables. Plant things that can be grown vertically to utilize as much space as possible. Plants like carrots, radishes, and beets that grow downward shouldn't be forgotten. Don't worry if one crop fails while another thrives. That is one of the reasons to plant a variety. Happy growing.

Major development projects advance near Fairlington

Fairlington residents have likely observed major real estate development projects that are underway only blocks from Fairlington. At least three are currently in progress, with three more on the drawing board.

This month's *Bulletin* looks at those where construction work is occurring, while next month's issue will look at other projects that are being planned. FCA had previously endorsed the general outline of the three that are now under construction when they came before county and city governing bodies for permitting.

Waypoint at Fairlington

Rising just behind Fairlington Presbyterian Church on King Street, the Waypoint at Fairlington will offer 81 units of affordable apartment housing targeted to working families in Alexandria.

The project is a partnership between the church and Wesley Housing, a leading developer and manager of affordable housing in Northern Virginia.

The 4-story building will offer a mix of efficiencies, and one-, two-, and three-bedroom units. It will serve families with incomes of no more than 60 percent of area median income.

Construction is slated to be completed later this spring, with the first tenants moving in during the summer.

The Waypoint is the result of a desire by Fairlington Presbyterian to redevelop their underutilized parking lot in a way that extends their social justice mission and provides operational and financial benefits.

During construction neighboring Fairlington Methodist Church is allowing its parking lot to be use for construction vehicles.

Leaders of Fairlington Presbyterian and Wesley Housing met with FCA as the project was being planned.

WETA Expansion



This fall WETA phased road closures to minimize the impact on traffic and pedestrians near the headquarters building.

Public television station WETA is consolidating all of its operations at its headquarters building on Campbell Avenue in Shirlington. This includes relocating its production studio, which originates PBS NewsHour each weeknight, from its long-time location on S. 27th St. near Jennie Dean Park.

The project will renovate 90,000 square feet of office space in the current office tower and add additional space by converting the patio area between the current building and the parking garage to a four-story structure connected to the office building.

The bulk of the building addition is expected to be completed by August of this year, with the internal renovation being completed by January 2023.

One aspect of the new addition will be a street-level window that looks onto a video wall showing broadcast or production activities inside the building.

During construction drivers and pedestrians going through Shirlington may occasionally experience street and sidewalk closures.

When construction is complete, all WETA employees will be located at the building on Campbell Ave. WETA leaders project that roughly 350 employees will work in the Shirlington building.

FCA supported WETA's request to Arlington County for additional density to accommodate the consolidation.

Lindsay Automotive

This fall the contractor demolished the Fairlington Medical Center office building at Quaker Lane and Osage St. to make way for a new Lindsay Automotive Volvo sales and service dealership, part of a larger plan to update and expand Lindsay Automotive's properties across from Fairlington.

Construction is currently underway on basic infrastructure on the vacant lot, which is adjacent to the Fairlington Centre. Parking at the shopping center is not affected by the construction.

Plans also call for renovating the Cadillac dealership across Kenwood Street and converting it to Lexus Sales and Service. The Cadillac business will be relocated to the site of the existing Lexus dealership at King Street and Quaker Lane.

The project will include undergrounding utilities along the perimeter streets and installing new streetscapes, with street trees and larger sidewalks.

The work is being phased and is expected to take three years to complete.


The Lindsay president briefed FCA on the project in August 2020. FCA supported the company's permitting request to the City of Alexandria.

male deer rub their antlers against small trees, which can injure the trees. Hungry deer will seek food where they can find it, including in residents' yards and gardens, where they can damage landscapes. There are also more frequent deer-vehicle collisions and more transmission of tick-borne diseases. Where they are highly concentrated, deer can more easily transmit disease to other deer, and as food supply diminishes, they can starve.

Deer population over time

Deer are beautiful and an important part of the forest ecosystem. How did we end up today with so many? The white-tailed deer population in North America began to decline after European settlement. By the 1930s, deer had almost disappeared from Virginia. Many eastern states put strict regulations in place to protect deer and habitat, and they began restocking programs. The population began to rebound.

Development continued to fragment forest, creating more of the open edge habitat deer prefer. Since deer can reach sexual maturity at 6 months and give birth to 1–3 young each year, their population multiplied quickly. At the same time, large predators of deer, like the gray wolf and eastern cougar, were effectively extirpated from Virginia.

Assessing Arlington's deer population and next steps

In response to concerns about the impact of deer in Arlington's forests and other natural areas, Arlington county hired an independent contractor to conduct a drone survey of the population in spring 2021. Limitations of the survey included that federal property owners (National Park Service, Pentagon, Arlington National Cemetery, Reagan National Airport) did not grant permission so these areas were excluded, and the drones could not fly at night when heat signatures are more detectable.

However, the survey did find sections of Arlington where deer were too heavily concentrated, including the Military Rd. and Glencarlyn neighborhood areas. The contractor recommended aggressive deer management in these areas. Arlington is in the process of hiring a consultant to determine if a deer management strategy is needed and if so, to develop an implementation plan.

Some jurisdictions have considered immunocontraceptive vaccines, but the Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources will not approve of these methods for deer management. Indeed, the DWR and most other wildlife experts say medical intervention is ineffective and point to a lack

of peer-reviewed scientific articles showing otherwise.

Neighboring jurisdictions have implemented managed hunting, using professional sharpshooters or volunteers with rifles or archery tackle. Fairfax County has had a deer management program in place since 1998. Montgomery County established a deer management program in 1996. Both counties use all three hunting methods.

The National Park Service established a deer management plant in 2012, which uses professional sharpshooters who hunt at night in collaboration with police authorities. All three jurisdictions have had no safety incidents since their programs' inceptions. Rates of nonlethal wounding are very low due to a high level of supervisory oversight.

Where they are highly concentrated, deer are damaging forests in Arlington. Other species that rely on the forest ecosystem pay the price. Without its large predators, the deer population is out of balance. 


Let it snow! January comes in like a lion



DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



Birds in the snow: a look at popular neighborhood species

As I write this column, the ground is covered by at least six inches of snow. Typically, the second month of the year is the most dormant in terms of plants and flowers. Evergreens are prominent and a few specimens flower, but that's it.

Fruited and variegated specimens show in winter but there isn't much else. Given that, I'll focus on birds we commonly see in our neighborhood, even in the cold months of winter.

Cardinal: This bird is frequently seen in its vivid, red plumage. Plus, it doesn't migrate south in winter. Usually, the female is on the move with a male in her wake. Rarely are two males seen together, which is why the St. Louis Cardinals' baseball uniform (two males perched on a bat) is faulty. The male and female both sing in "cheer-cheer" lyrics. A friend once told me that seeing a cardinal is good luck since the bird is a messenger of hope and love. It's also called the "visitor from"

Heaven." No wonder it's depicted on Christmas cards. The desert cardinal (Arizona and New Mexico) male only has red on its vest and the female is all gray.

Mockingbird: This one loves to mimic and may be the tamest of all. Oftentimes, I've approached one in Fairlington and it freezes and stares. It easily perches on a twig or branch since it is a passerine, meaning it has three toes facing forward and another facing backward. There used to be a young male that mimicked vehicle alarms on South 36th Street in the Glen. It did so in the middle of the night. The mockingbird has a grayish coat with white flecks in its wings. The male and female each has a courting dance where they walk, stop, spread their wings. The juvenile mockingbird resembles a thrush, sporting speckles on its underside. The mockingbird's Greek nomenclature is Mimus polyglottos. Polyglottos, the species name, is Greek for "multiple languages." In Harper Lee's 1960 Pulitzer Prize-winning book, To Kill a Mockingbird, the title symbolizes sinfulness since the mockingbird signifies innocence. In the book, a black man is wrongly convicted of sexually assaulting a white woman.

Catbird: The quickest way to spot one is to thoroughly weed your garden so nothing is left but virgin soil. Soon, you'll see a catbird singing and hopping over the tilled dirt in search of earthworms. Males and females are alike with gray plumage and black on their crowns, tail and

wings. It is so named due to its catlike cry. The catbird is in the same family (Mimidae) as the mockingbird and thus, will mimic the calls of other birds but in a raspy tone.

Cooper's Hawk: A 14–20-inch-long bird of prey which calls Virginia home all year long, it's commonly seen gliding from one tall tree limb to another. Daily, I notice one perched atop a utility pole on the side of the highway where it watches for dead rodents. The hawk is stealthy, hiding in dense brush while waiting for a vulnerable bird feeding on the ground. The hawk's underbelly is a mottled ivory and buff. It has a grayish back, short wings (allowing for turns and maneuvers) and a long tail with black and gray bands on top and on the underside. Its legs are meaty as are its toes. When the hawk is in flight, an observer on the ground will notice a pattern of brown and white on underside of the bird's wings.






