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Home Improvement Seminar set for February 3

The third annual Fairlington Home Improvement Seminar will showcase the advice and expertise of remodeling and repair contractors who are well-versed in the fun and foibles of improving a Fairlington home. The day-long event on Saturday, February 3, will feature seminar sessions at the Fairlington Community Center (FCC), 3308 S. Stafford St., starting at 9 am in Room 118. Attendees will also have a chance to consult with contractors on a more personal basis before and after each session in Room 134.

The seminar format will be similar to last year and provide an opportunity for in-depth discussion of home renovation and repair issues and options. Space will be limited based on room occupancy codes. Those interested in attending a session will be admitted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Fairlington homeowners can find solutions to several different home improvement challenges. Remodeling contractors and repair and upgrade service providers, who are familiar to *Bulletin* readers, and neighbors who have used those contractors' services will host the seminars. Topics could include kitchen remodeling, bathroom makeovers, plumbing challenges, window and door replacement, electrical and lighting options, flooring upgrades, and effective landscaping.

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County board approves Fairlington Park renovation

The Arlington County Board has approved a contract for renovating Fairlington Park at the Fairlington Community Center. The project includes a new playground for both two-to-five and five-to-12 age groups, outdoor fitness equipment, a picnic area, better handicapped accessibility, and drainage and stormwater management improvements.

The county board approved the \$2.1 million project at its December 16 meeting. Construction is expected to begin in the spring, with completion occurring this fall.

In 2016, county staff held several meetings with Fairlington residents to refine the plans for the playground. In response to these meetings, the final design increased the number of swings, something many parents requested.

According to Aaron Wohler, the county landscape architect who is coordinating the project, the playground will be closed during the renovation. The entire play area needs to be excavated and graded for the stormwater management aspect of the project. Consequently, the contractor will want to remove all of the existing elements at once.

In a December letter to the county board, FCA indicated its support for the renovation, but expressed disappointment that all of the playground would be inaccessible for most of the spring and summer.

During December's county board discussion of the contract, board member Christian Dorsey cited FCA's concern about the entire playground being closed during the renovation. County Manager Mark Schwartz said he had instructed county staff to work with the contractor and see if there were ways to keep parts of the playground open during the renovation.

During construction, the athletic field will be closed due to the renovation of the site circulation surrounding the field.

The scope of work includes the following activities:

- Removal and replacement of existing site furnishings
- Removal and replacement of play/exercise equipment. New equipment includes three swings, composite play structures (more traditional platform style) for both young and older age groups, climbing apparatuses (ropes, cubes, sky cabins)
- Removal and replacement of pathways (playground area)
- Removal of amphitheater and a few trees
- Installation of new sand area with play apparatus, water spigot, and shade structure
- Installation of a picnic area with three picnic tables
- Stormwater management/drainage
- Milling and overlay of existing asphalt walkways with eight-foot uniform width throughout the park
- Park signage, including a bulletin board
- Fencing and gates around the play area for two- to-five-year-olds
- Landscaping/irrigation

Rep. Beyer to host helicopter noise forum

Congressman Don Beyer will host a community forum on helicopter noise on Tuesday, January 16, from 7:30 to 9 pm at Abingdon Elementary School. The forum will be with the Department of Defense (DoD) and is part of a study Beyer had included in the National Defense Authorization Act in 2016.

The provision was proposed by Beyer in response to frequent complaints from constituents, particularly in Fairlington, about excess noise from military helicopters. It directs DoD to study changes to the region's helicopter flight routes, operating procedures, and types of helicopters flown in the national capital airspace to mitigate the effect of noise on the region's neighborhoods.

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New FCA board selected for 2018

A new Executive Board of the Fairlington Citizens Association (FCA) was selected at December's annual meeting. Fairlington residents returned eight sitting members, and elected one new member to the board.

The FCA is a county-recognized umbrella civic organization for North and South Fairlington, Park Shirlington, and Shirlington House. The FCA'S mission is to promote activities that make Fairlington a better community in which to live,

serve as a forum for discussion of residents' concerns, and represent their views to local government.

Returning to officer slots are President Guy Land and Treasurer Ed Hilz. Chris Weathers will serve as Vice President, and Evan Harvey will fill the Secretary position. Returning board members are Hugh Baumgardner, Jennifer Davies, Kent Duffy, and Lindsay Willmann. Joining the board is South Fairlington homeowner Rebecca Sayres, who has contributed to the *Bulletin* throughout 2017. Jonathan Ansley did not seek re-election.

The candidates were elected without opposition. Officers and directors serve one-year terms and receive no

compensation for their service on the board. All Fairlington residents and owners are members of the FCA. The FCA does not rely on member dues to fund the civic association.

President Guy Land reported on 2017's major activities pertaining to engagement with elected officials and staff, the monitoring of development and transportation issues, and enriching life in Fairlington. Specifically, Land highlighted Cap-

tain Adrienne Quigley as well as Arlington County Board members John Vihstadt and Katie Cristol, who addressed the FCA this past year; the I-395 sound walls and Fairlington Presbyterian affordable housing proposal; and the well-received inaugural Family Movie Night.

Treasurer Ed Hilz reported that the Association's year-to-date finances showed a net profit of roughly \$9,000. FCA is the only Arlington civic association that doesn't charge dues. The group's main source of revenue is the income from advertising in the *Bulletin*. It was noted that the FCA will continue to sponsor community events like the annual Fourth of July Parade and Fairlington Farmer's Market.

Additionally, Land previewed items on tap for 2018, including events to commemorate Fairlington's 75th anniversary, the contractor showcase, Abingdon 5K run/walk, another Family Movie Night, and the annual Fourth of July parade. Land indicated the FCA would continue to monitor and report on development near Fairlington.

Lastly, Land issued a call for volunteers to help with upcoming activities. He noted, "Donating even an hour or two a few times a year to help with neighborhood activities would make a real difference in the FCA's ability to fulfill its mission of making Fairlington the best place to live that it can be." 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Arlington approves affordable housing conservation district

The Arlington County Board is moving forward with a proposal to create a Housing Conservation District framework to encourage the preservation of affordable housing. The district would include Park Shirlington Apartments and Shirlington House, which currently have a significant number of affordable housing rental units.

The framework would apply to neighborhoods generally composed of garden-style apartment complexes with market-rate affordable rents. Housing is considered "affordable" when a household spends no more than 30 percent of its monthly income on rent or mortgage payments. Rents that are "market-rate affordable" are within the means of households earning up to 80 percent of area median income.

The framework and associated incentives for developers

A new owner has taken over Park Shirlington Apartments, promising to rehabilitate and preserve the property as affordable housing. Located at 4510 S. 31st St., Park Shirlington has 294 units.

Standard Property Company, in partnership with the National Foundation for Affordable Housing solutions, acquired the property from Home Properties in early December. The financing for the sale included a \$6 million loan from Arlington County's Affordable Housing Investment Fund. The county board approved the loan in late November.

In 2013, Home Properties proposed to replace the existing 294 apartments with 750 new apartments in five buildings that would be three- to five-stories high, with most of the units being market rate with rents competitive with those in Shirlington. These plans were put on indefinite hold in 2014 when Home Properties announced a change in its business strategy and exited the new development business in order to concentrate on acquiring and upgrading older properties.

or apartment owners would encourage the construction and preservation of affordable rental housing, and attempt to prevent the loss of market-rate affordable housing.

Market-rate affordable housing in Arlington has been diminishing rapidly because of strong housing demand, which has boosted rents.

The Housing Conservation District would cover apartment buildings and complexes in 12 general areas in the county, including Shirlington, with the designated area covering Park Shirlington and Shirlington House.

The framework would allow for a spectrum of development projects within the conservation district, ranging from renovations and minor additions, to infill and redevelopment. In exchange for the ability to complete these projects, property owners and developers would be required to dedicate a share of on-site housing units for lower- and moderate-income households.

The conversion of affordable apartments to townhouses, however, would require the developer to satisfy a special exception use requirement, thereby reducing the

Alexandria affordable housing project advances

Fairlington Presbyterian Church and its development partner, Wesley Housing Development Corporation, have prepared a revised concept for converting part of the church's parking lot to 81 affordable housing units. The property is located at 3846 King St., just across King from Fairlington Mews.

Representatives from the church and the developer briefed the neighbors on the revised plans on December 11. The plan will be considered by the City of Alexandria this year. A public hearing would likely occur this fall, with construction expected to begin in the summer of 2020 and be completed by the end of 2021.

The project is designed to address the shortage of affordable worker housing in Alexandria. All of the units would be reserved for low-income households, with the maximum household tenant income not to exceed roughly \$66,000 per year for a family of four.

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County board approves aquatics center

After more than 10 years of planning and negotiating, the Arlington County Board in late November approved a \$60 million contract for the design and building of the Long Bridge Aquatics & Fitness Center, Arlington's first free-standing aquatics center.

Located just up I-395 at the north end of Crystal City near the 14th St. Bridge, the project will also include development of 10.5 acres of additional park space, including environmental remediation, public gathering areas, one or more rain gardens, and parking.

The existing Long Bridge Park, which is already popular with Arlingtonians, features three full-size, multi-sport, lighted fields, a network of walkways, views of capital monuments, public art, healthy vending machines, and a three-quarter acre rain garden that directs runoff from the park's sports fields and parking lot into a planted garden of native shrubs and perennials.

The centerpiece of this park expansion project is a 50-meter pool, which will offer one-, three-, and five-meter diving. It will be large enough that even when swim events are taking place, lanes will be open to the public. The facility will also include a second leisure/family pool, a fitness center, and community rooms.

In a first for the county, the project used a design-build approach to help hold costs down. Funding for the park was approved in a prior bond issue. Construction may begin as early as July 2018.

County leaders outline budget challenges

Arlington County Manager Mark Schwartz and Arlington Public Schools (APS) Superintendent Dr. Patrick Murphy outlined budget challenges and other policy issues to members of the Arlington County Civic Federation at its December meeting. FCA is an active member of the federation.

Murphy noted that this fall's enrollment in APS, roughly 27,000 students, is the largest in the school system's history. Projections call for enrollment to continue to grow at a rate of 2,100 to 2,200 students per year.

These enrollment increases are driving the construction of new schools across the county, including new high schools at the Arlington Career Center on S. Walter Reed

Dr., and a new neighborhood elementary at the Reed-Westover Building on N. McKinley Rd.

Schwartz reported that the county board had instructed him to prepare a budget for FY19 that contained no increase in the tax rate, though he noted that because of an increase in assessed values, actual taxes paid by residents would likely increase modestly.

He said that keeping the current tax rate would likely result in a shortfall of \$12 to \$15 million, which would have to be offset by reductions and efficiencies.

Schwartz stated that the county's residential real estate market is the strongest it's been in the last four years, but that commercial vacancies continue to exert downward pressure on tax revenues.

Schwartz said that the county's biggest challenges were those that come from growth. "I'm very optimistic about the future of our county," he said.

I-395 sound wall voting continues

With voting on the southbound I-395 express lanes sound walls completed (but not yet reported), attention now turns to the sound barriers on the northbound side, with voting expected to begin soon.

The noise analysis firm facilitating the voting process is preparing a memorandum describing the outcome of the voting process in North Fairlington. The results of the voting will then be released to the public.

As of mid-December, balloting for residents benefited by the proposed sound walls along northbound I-395 had not yet begun. The private contractor had been working with Fairlington Mews to schedule an additional outreach meeting to inform residents of the need for a temporary construction easement along the King St. entrance ramp to northbound I-395 before distributing ballots. Ballots should be distributed once that meeting has been set.

The first ballot will be sent by regular mail, and eligible residents will have 21 days to return it. If the response

rate is not greater than 50 percent, a second ballot will be sent by certified mail to anyone who did not return the initial ballot. Residents will have 15 days to return the second ballot.

If the proposed sound barrier is approved by the community, construction would occur during the current stage of the project, which stretches from now to fall 2018.

According to Geoffrey Vetter, communications specialist with AECOM (the private company coordinating the public outreach on the express lanes project), work will continue on the project throughout the winter season. He encourages commuters to drive safely and pay attention to on-road signage if they're traveling near the area of lane closures.

Joe Oullette, a principal at Standard Property Company, said that detailed plans for the property had not yet been developed, but that the general plan was to retain the existing buildings and "sprinkle in" additional units over the next several years.

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FCA plans 75th anniversary festivities

A celebratory catered reception with speakers, a kids' geocaching hunt, and a revised reprise of the fall history walk are among the activities the FCA board is working on to mark Fairlington's 75th anniversary in 2018. FCA will partner with the Fairlington Historical Society to provide opportunities for residents to learn more about our community's history.

FCA is also exploring reproducing photos of Fairlington—both early and more contemporary ones—that would be suitable for framing. These are likely to be available for online ordering later in the spring.

All of these options drew strong support in the online survey FCA hosted in November and December. A wine reception led the list of potential events, garnering the endorsement of 41 percent of the respondents. A picnic or BBQ came in second, with the support of 30 percent

of respondents. The history walk was the first choice of 15 percent of those who took the survey.

Over half of those responding said they would be interested in purchasing reproductions of early photos. Other popular commemorative items included a Fairlington calendar, mugs and drinkware, and anniversary T-shirts.

Many residents provided helpful suggestions and comments, and the board is considering how to weave some of those into its planned activities.

Volunteers are needed to help make this anniversary celebration special. Please let FCA know if you can donate just a couple of hours to help mark this milestone in our neighborhood's history.

Fairlington's 75th lookback: Boundary Stone

To celebrate our 75th anniversary, we'll take a look at Fairlington's history in each issue of the Bulletin this year.

One of Fairlington's significant historic assets is Boundary Stone Southwest #4, one of 40 milepost stones that mark the original District of Columbia. It is located on King St., between S. Wakefield St. and the entrance ramp to I-395, just outside the newly replaced Mews bound-

ary fence. After many years of obscurity, shrouded in shrubs on the narrow shoulder of King St. and obscured by a chain link fence, the stone and its enclosure is now very accessible thanks to the gate conveniently placed in the new fence by the community-spirited Mews board.

The Stone was placed in 1791 by a party led by surveyor Andrew Ellicott. Ellicott's description of the area at the time is a stark contrast to the current surroundings. "The country through which we are now cutting one of the ten-mile lines is very poor. I think for near seven miles, on it there is not one house that has any floor except the earth, and what is more strange it is in the neighborhood of Alexandria and Georgetown."

In 1846, the entire southwest portion of the District—including most of the land on which Fairlington is located—was retroceded from the Federal City back to Virginia. The boundary

stones remained in place, although, some—including our #4—were damaged or moved.

In 1915, the District chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) took on the task of pre-

> serving all of the stones. They erected protective iron cages around them, added explanatory plaques, and took on the long-term task of maintenance. Of these, 34 remain today.

Six years after Fairlington construction was completed, in 1949, the DAR historian reported that our #4 stone was in poor condition, "... broken off almost even with the ground." In 1970, two years before Fairlington's conversion to condominiums began, King St. was

widened and the DAR noted that the stone had been buried, but was rescued and re-set 13 feet north of its original location (The Fairlington Boundary Stone, DAR, 2002). For more on our Boundary Stone, go to www.fairlingtonhistoricalsociety.org.

County to acquire Shirlington Rd. property

At its October 24 meeting, the Arlington County Board voted to authorize the purchase of land at 2629 and 2633 Shirlington Rd. for ART bus parking and storage. The parcels are next to the Cube Smart storage building (2631 Shirlington Rd.). Last year, the county executed a seven-year lease on 2629 Shirlington Rd. for ART bus parking.

An appraisal commissioned by the county reported that the land parcels have a current market value of \$20.5 million.

According to the county manager, within six months, 13 vehicles will be added to the fleet, and an additional six buses will be added by 2020. A permanent location is needed for ART to provide the operations facility necessary to support the system's needs. The growth that is underway and planned was approved in the board-adopted 10-year Transit Development Plan.

A year ago, the owner of the property proposed a swap of the Shirlington Rd. property for a parcel on N. Quincy St. (the Buck property), which the county had an option to purchase. However, the county had been looking at different uses for that property and is not prepared to do a swap at this time.

The county board vote also authorized acquisition of the property by eminent domain if an effort to purchase the property is unsuccessful.

likelihood that buildings in the Housing Conservation District would be converted to townhouses. Potential impacts from townhouse development would be assessed on a case-by-case basis, with the goal of mini-

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mizing negative impacts on existing nearby properties.

By including Park Shirlington within the Housing Conservation District, the kind of major townhouse development that was proposed for that property in 2013 would likely be subject to more stringent scrutiny than under current county rules. Park Shirlington was recently sold to a private developer who has stated an intention to maintain the property as affordable housing.

FCA had expressed its general support for the concept of the Housing Conservation District, viewing it as a way to limit major townhouse redevelopment in Park Shirlington, preserve the character of the community, and maintain a diverse population in the area. FCA was concerned about the impact that any increased density on that site could have on increased enrollment at Abingdon School.

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DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



Plant symbolism

Throughout winter, there is little dynamic growth in our gardens except the evergreens, everblues, or the few evergreens that flower (Camellia, Mahonia, PJM Rhododenron). But looking underneath the surface, we can see how plants are symbolic when applied to life. Below are some that convey messages in religion, sport, charity, sentiment, and politics. Keep these meanings in mind when making your plant selections for spring.

Fig Leaf is a symbol of personal modesty dating to the Book of Genesis in the Bible. It is used by Adam and Eve as cover. The leaf is wide and can grow eight inches long with a five-inch width. The fruit ripens in August and is used in jams, cookies, and biscuits. A fig tree needs space and reaches 10 feet tall with

a similar spread. The specimen likes full sun. It's easy to prune since the branches are succulent-like and soft.

Forget Me Nots are tiny, fivepetaled flowers that show in pink or blue, each with a yellow eye. Each bloom is only a half-inch wide. Myosotis is the less-affectionate sounding Latin genus. The flower is placed on gravesites—pine for a female loved one and blue for a male loved one.

Narcissus or Daffodil is a symbol used by the American Cancer Society for its March fund-raiser, *Daffodil Days*. The daffodil is seen as a symbol of hope. Flowers are purchased and delivered to those touched by cancer, with proceeds going toward research. Just off the south-bound lanes of Shirley Highway (I-395) and just west of the bridge that connects North and South Fairlington, there is a swath of yellow on a grassy slope when the flower blooms in March.

Olive Branch is pictured on the Great Seal of the United States. In the bald eagle's right claw is a branch filled with leaves and berries. In his right talons are 13 arrows, depicting the 13 original colonies. It symbolizes peace around the world. Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat brought an olive branch to the United Nations General Assembly in 1974. It is naturally found in the Mediterranean geographic region of Spain, Italy, Greece, and Turkey.

Palms are given to congregants in the Catholic Church on Palm Sunday, which precedes Easter Sunday by one week. Leaves of the Palm also symbolize celebration or triumph and are distributed to winners in athletic competitions. A Sabal Palmetto tree is depicted on the state flags of Florida and South Carolina—the latter known as the "Palmetto" state.

"Primrose Path" refers to a life of leisure. The primrose is the first flower to arrive at the nursery in late winter. Each flower has a yellow eye with petals in vivid purple, pink, orange, blue, or white. The flower lasts until early summer. The Primrose leaf is basal with sunken veins. It is a very tender perennial in our hot climate.

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
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ABING School news


