# On the street where you live— it's about parking

At the FCA meeting this month, there will be a discussion of changes that have affected much-prized street parking in Fairlington, and the county Parking Manager Sarah Stott, from Arlington's Transportation Division, will be on hand to answer residents' questions about parking issues in Fairlington and Shirlington. Parking has been much on the minds of some residents follow-

ing the county's seasonal street repair work last year between March and October, when several on-street parking spaces in south Fairlington went missing. Residents, particularly along S. Stafford Street, were quick to notice the "disappeared" spots after county work crews finished milling and surfacing, installing new curbs and gutters, and patching, paving, and re-striping. The removal of some street-side parking spaces—they used to be legal, and now they're not—stems from the county's policy to bring streets into compliance with federal, state, and municipal standards whenever they perform major improvement work. According to David Kirschner, an engineer with the Transportation Engineering and Operations Bureau: "When a street is resurfaced in Arlington, transportation staff review the existing parking and street operations to see if they conform to the required local and national standards and make changes where necessary."

The changes are particularly noticeable around bus stops, where additional clear-curb space was required to bring the areas into compliance with the standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act. Also, some other spaces were removed because it is "established county practice to allow for adequate sight distance at crosswalks: Parked vehicles that are too close to a crosswalk create an unsafe situation for pedestrians and passing vehicles, who may not be able to see one another until the pedestrian is crossing the travel lane." Additionally, parking spaces were removed if it was determined that they violated the following laws: Vehicles are required to provide 15 feet of clear space to a fire hydrant, and vehicles are not permitted to be parked within 20 feet of

#### FCA bylaws, updated

Next month, at the February 13 FCA meeting, residents can vote on proposed amendments to the bylaws of the Fairlington Citizens Association. FCA board members Mark Jones, Carol Dabbs, and Guy Land have worked diligently over the last year to bring the governing principles of Fairlington's civic association into alignment with the 21st century. Working on the association's bylaws is time-consuming and sometimes tedious work—all Fairlington residents can thank the bylaws committee for volunteering their time and effort on our behalf.

The full text of the proposed bylaws amendments can be found on the FCA Web site, www.fca-fairlington.org. In addition, hard copies of the amendments can be viewed at the Fairlington Community Center (3308 S. Stafford Street) and at the North Fairlington Community Center (3005 S. Abingdon Street). The following is a summary of the major goals addressed in the changes:

- To redefine and clarify the membership of the FCA, to specifically include all Fairlington residents, owners and renters
- To redefine and clarify the names and types of meetings that the FCA holds and/or sponsors, in order to increase the association's flexibility in response to events and to community needs
- To redefine and clarify the roles of officers and directors of the association
- To increase the executive board's flexibility by permitting voting by electronic means
- To improve the procedures for amending the bylaws, by submitting changes to the community
- To provide the association with greater flexibility in communicating with the community, to include expanded use of electronic means and social media.

The FCA held its annual election for the 2013 board at the December meeting. The new board members for 2013 are:

President, Guy Land Vice president, Kent Duffy Secretary, Carol Dabbs Treasurer, Ed Hilz Directors: Jacob Gelman, Joe Hartman, Mark Jones, Carrie Street, and Michelle Woolley.

FCA president Guy Land reviewed some of the board's priorities for the year, which include: Increase participation among our residents; strengthen communications with the condo and homeowners associations; enhance our overall communications strategy by making better use of social media; and continue to monitor real estate developments in the area and provide frequent updates to the community about them.

#### Delegate Krupicka's work in Richmond

Rob Krupicka, Virginia Delegate for the 45th District (Alexandria, Arlington, and Fairfax), offered the following as some of the issues he would be working on and pursuing in this year's General Assembly session. The 2013 GA session begins January 9, and is scheduled to run for 45 days.

- Sustainable transportation funding and support for the Potomac Yard Metro.
- A range of education issues with a focus on early education, closing the achievement gap as well as helping address the shortage of classroom space.
- Environmental bills focused on cleaning up the Chesapeake Bay as well as Clean Energy legislation.

- A veterans study bill to make sure we are properly planning so we can support the growing veterans population in the state.
- Working with local officials and the state on a few measures related to reducing red tape for small businesses.
- Working on a few different pieces of equality and anti-discrimination legislation.
- Drafting a few measures related to early voting and ensuring people can vote without long lines.
- Evaluating some legislation related to stalking and public safety.

# ConnectArlington will bring short-term construction, long-term benefit

Arlington is constructing a fiber-optic network that will interconnect government offices, public school buildings, and traffic signals throughout the county. Once completely installed, the network, dubbed ConnectArlington, will provide state-of-the-art communications for the county's intergovernmental functions. The work is described as "a long-term investment to address future telecommunications needs and bandwidth requirements," which will create a broadband fiber-optic network for education, public safety, transportation, and government use, and will also reduce county and APS expenses for commercial telecommunications services.

According to the ConnectArlington Web site, the county currently relies on a combination of county-owned facilities, lines leased from commercial providers, and a fiber-optic network made available by Comcast under the terms of its cable TV franchise. The county and Comcast are now engaged in a franchise renewal process, whose outcome will not be known for some time. To ensure continuity and expansion of its essential telecommunication services, the county is building ConnectArlington.

The project will require construction projects across Arlington, to include aerial work (the attachment of new cabling to existing telephone and utility poles) and underground work (mostly directional drilling with a small amount of open trenching). In the Fairlington neighborhood, watch for construction vehicles, excavators, work crews, and bucket trucks to get underway as early as this month or next, said ConnectArlington staff representative Laura Szlavin. The short-lived digging and detours will serve in the long run to connect Abingdon Elementary School, Fire Station 7, and the Fairlington Community Center.

The route for construction is planned to proceed from the Shirlington Bus Station, up 31st Street S., to S. Abingdon Street, picking up the school along the way. The route will then turn left at Abingdon to enter the firehouse. It will then cross the bridge over I-395, and continue along 34th Street S. to S. Utah Street. At the intersection, it will turn left onto Utah and enter the service vehicle access drive at the FCC.

The work north of I-395 is expected to be completed in early spring. The work south of I-395 will begin shortly thereafter, to be completed by the summer.

Szlavin offered the sensible caveat that construction

can be delayed because of weather or any number of conditions that work crews encounter, and that proposed pathways for construction also could change for the same reasons. ConnnectArlington notified the FCA about the coming construction in order to provide a heads-up to residents: They wanted to "ensure that affected neighborhoods were kept well informed in advance of the construction and that the construction would have a minimal impact on the community." an intersection. Kirschner added that the 15-feet and 20-feet distance requirements have always been the law (though, in practice, many people ignored it), but now there are pavement markings and signs to reinforce the restrictions.

Whenever and wherever street changes occur, Arlington is mindful of how residents may be impacted, said Kirschner: "We approached any changes

of parking locations in Fairlington as conservatively as possible, being acutely aware of the need for on-street parking. In some cases parking is now permitted where it was not previously. For example, westbound 34th St. S. approaching S. Utah St. now allows for several more vehicles to be parked than previously." In addition, he said, when the traffic engineers sign or mark pavement to denote the 20-feet-to-an-intersection rule, they do so by looking at each individual case and making a practical judgment based on enhanced sight lines and safety.

Still, the reduced parking took some residents by surprise, and they were not pleased. Kirschner explained that TE&O does not solicit public comment/input on changes that are operational in nature, and that the short time frame for the paving work did not allow for alerting people about upcoming changes. And that's too bad—a little advance warning could have helped neighbors better understand and cope with the loss of reliedupon parking spots.

# Dominion repairs underground cables in electric grid



The construction work now underway on S. Utah Street will eventually provide new electric cables to replace "vintage" ones as Dominion Virginia Power described the oldest remaining bits of underground bulk feeder cable on the mainline of Fairlington's

electrical grid in that area. Last summer, said a Dominion engineer, the system experienced failures on two spans of bulk feeder cable along Utah, which necessitated digging slit trenches and removing some sidewalks to gain access to the faulty cable spans, remove them, and install new cable. The work is proceeding along Utah to the north, between 34th St. and 32nd Road S., and to the south, between 35th Street S. and S. Taylor Street.

The replacement work was on schedule in December to be completed by Christmas. The next step is to terminate the old cable and splice and energize the new cable. That work is planned for early this year. Between the two steps, residents may see ends of non-energized cable exposed above ground near the devices they will be tied in to. The final, re-energizing step will require power outages of varying durations in the surrounding area. Dominion said that affected condo associations and

residents would be notified by letter to let them know when the outage would occur.

In addition, Dominion has similar work in varying stages of design for Fairlington areas north of 1-395. Condo associations and individual customers will be notified when work is scheduled to begin on those projects.



# Safeway may be closing next month





Unofficial word has it that the Safeway store near Bradlee will close in February. The long anticipated store reconstruction, originally expected to begin last summer, was delayed, said store employees recently, so that the store could serve customers through the end-of-year holiday season and also stay open while other nearby Safeway stores were closed for renovations. Temporary quarters for the Safeway pharmacy (*pictured, above*) appears ready to open in the new trailer nearby on Marlee Way, between the King St. service road and Braddock Rd.

# Update: Intersection of S. 36th Street and N. Quaker Lane

The sometimes very busy intersection of S. 36th Street (in Arlington) and N. Quaker Lane (in Alexandria) was being examined by Alexandria's Parking and Traf-

fic Board for possible safety-improvement changes. At a meeting last summer, the board heard a proposal that would prohibit left turns from north-bound Quaker onto S. 36th. The public was invited to provide comment at the board's October meeting, but the intersection agenda item was removed from the docket. After further consideration last fall by the city's Traffic and Environmental Services Department, Alexandria abandoned the plan to restrict left turns from Quaker onto 36th. Alexandria T&ES decided that making the proposed changes essentially would create other traffic roadblocks.



#### Fairlington history: How we achieved landmark status

Fairlington was placed on the Virginia Landmarks Register in December, 1998 and on the National Register of Historic Places in March, 1999. As a result, Fairlington is deemed a cultural resource worthy of preservation. But gaining that recognition was no simple matter—it didn't come with just making a phone call or writing a letter. Today the neighborhood enjoys landmark status due to a diligent and committed

band of volunteers who worked for the ten years prior to designation to make it happen.

The historical designation committee undertook the job of satisfying the rigorous requirements for submitting an application to Virginia's Department of Historic Resources. The work included developing an architectural survey of Fairlington's buildings, which identified the building types and materials, and then training a team of more than 100 volunteers to walk the grounds, take photographs and measurements, and create a building survey.

To mark the achievement of securing both state and national historic designation, the committee installed a granite marker with the Virginia Landmarks and National Register plaques on S. Abingdon Street near the North Fairlington Community Center and affixed oval bronze plaques to the brick entrance walls that mark major access points to Fairlington.

The Fairlington Historical Society was founded as an outgrowth of the decade-long pursuit for historic designation. FHS sponsors the very popular, every-other-year Home & Garden tour (to be held this year in May), and publishes *Fairlington at 50: May 1943 – May 1993*, which is considered the neighborhood's definitive history. To celebrate Fairlington's 70th birthday this year, FHS is issuing a special memorial edition of the book, dedicated to its author, the late Catherine Fellows. **Government snow day?** The federal government, through the Office of Personnel Management, exerts heavy influence on regulating the region's commute on stormy days. 

No matter which design wins this year, the decal will feature a ship—student-designers were asked to incorporate an image of the soon-to-be commissioned USS Arlington, an amphibious landing platform dock naval vessel, named to honor Arlington's response to the 9/11 attack on the Pentagon in 2001.





## FAIRLINGTON AND ELECTRIC HEAT

There are two different types of electric heat in Fairlington: straight electric heat and heat pumps. There are many schools of thought on which is better and many people believe that both have individual drawbacks. This month we'll try to distinguish between the two and give you the pros and cons of both.

Straight electric heat uses heat coils (similar to those found in your blow dryer) to heat your home which makes it very dry and somewhat expensive. Electric heat has output temperatures that exceed 115 degrees so it is perceived as being warmer heat but can cause static and excessively dry air. Humidifiers can often cure this while allowing you to run your heat at lower temperatures. It is quite common for many straight electric furnaces to lose one or more elements during the course of the heating season. If your house does not feel as warm as it did in previous years, this is probably why. If this happens, call us immediately to avoid any further problems.

Heat pumps have output temperatures of about 90 degrees which some people perceive as being less comfortable and colder than straight electric heat but heat pumps are also much more energy and cost efficient than straight electric heat. Keep in mind that in a normal home temperature should be maintained at about 70 degrees. Longer cycles are normal with heat pumps since output temperatures are lower. On cold days, 20 to 30 minute cycles are completely normal for a heat pump. Frost forming on your outdoor unit

sporadically when outdoor temperatures fall below 40 degrees is also normal with a heat pump. However, a block of ice encasing your outdoor unit is NOT normal and is usually caused by a lack of freon. If this happens, set your thermostat to emergency heat and call us for service.



#### What's in a name?

# DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



#### The winter garden is a feast for the eyes—and the birds

Imagine having colorful ornaments decorating your garden's leafless branches in late fall and winter. Specimen fruit in various colors enlivens the bleak dormancy of a perennial garden devoid of evergreens. And with fruit come visitors seeking a winter meal. Cardinals, mockingbirds, sparrows, wrens, and cedar waxwings remain in our area during winter and need food, water, and shelter.

If your garden lacks the winter flower color of a camellia, "Knockout" rose, or "Encore" azalea, try planting the following specimens next spring. Come winter, you will have your share of color and wildlife to enjoy when looking out the window.

**Beautyberry.** This multi-stemmed shrub bears white flowers in summer. Its leaves turn yellowish-green in fall before dropping. Once that happens, clusters of smallish, shiny, purple fruit cling to thin branches. The Beautyberry fruit is easy to admire since the shrub grows only 4 - 5 feet tall with a similar spread.

**Winterberry.** The only deciduous holly becomes leafless in late November, revealing round, red drupes that hang like miniature Christmas balls on the stiff branches. Planted against the beige/grey wood of a patio fence, the red spheres will stand out all winter long.

**Serviceberry.** This ornamental tree is one of the first to flower, along with the Bradford pear and dogwood. It has whitish-pink blossoms

in late February and March. Come fall, purplish-pink fruit fill the network of branches until birds flock to it looking for a sweet meal. You can try to gather the fruit yourself to make jam or even a pie.

**Dogwood.** While its flowers are pink and white and noticeable in early spring, the fruit is subtle and resembles a red seed. You will know both birds and squirrels have visited for a meal when you see cracked-open bits of the fruit lying on the ground.

**Crab apple.** The tree won't fit in a patio, but you can walk around the common areas of Fairlington and see the cranberry-colored, translucent fruit hanging off branches like cherries with long stems. If there is a cedar waxwing in the area, it will land here to sample the fruit.

**Nandina.** It grows all over Fairlington, especially on the circle between S. Stafford and 36th St. S. The evergreen's foliage turns reddish in winter and bears clumps of holly-like red berries. Tiny white flowers appear on branch tips in April. The

leaves are so slight they "whisper" when a gust of wind blows.

**Tea viburnum.** White flowers appear in April and May but a prettier display comes in December/January when burgundy berries fill the branches on this 10 foot tall, 8 foot wide specimen. Drive by the corner of Valley Drive and Summit Ave. in Alexandria and you will see two of them planted among crab apple trees that bear apricot-colored fruit. When I was there, a flock of cowbirds was gobbling the viburnum fruit.

**Pyracantha.** Look for the mockingbird to enjoy the plentiful orange berries while also building a nest in this thorny evergreen vine. I saw a mockingbird snuggled in its nest in a pyracantha against a brick wall in Old Town last year. The vine bears white flowers in spring.

**Ligustrum.** A rounded, dense evergreen shrub, there are many in Fairlington that bear dark blue, eggshaped drupes in winter. The thick, dense habit is also ideal for nesting birds. The leaf resembles that of a camellia with its pointed tip and glossy surface.

**Liriope.** The mainstay of ground covers bears a bounty of shiny black fruit in winter, a few months after its spiked lavender flowers have passed in September. The mounded evergreen foliage makes for an attractive plant year-round.

# Abingdon to host another Movie Night




