Arlington police to brief FCA on June 8

The Arlington County Police Department (ACPD) will give an update on crime and safety in the Fairlington area on Wednesday, June 8 at 7 p.m. at the monthly FCA meeting. The meeting will be held inperson at the Fairlington Community Center and all Fairlington residents and homeowners are invited to attend.

Crime in Fairlington has been a recent hot topic for the local community after a number of alarming

incidents. In late April, police swarmed the neighborhood chasing a stolen vehicle which crashed at the intersection of S. Abingdon St. and 30th St. S. Three suspects then fled on foot. The suspects remain at large.

Several residents have also been recent victims of catalytic converter theft. According to Captain Scott Linder of the Community Engagement Division of ACPD, larcenies of these items, air bags and thefts from unlocked vehicles seem to be an overall constant throughout the year and county.

"Unlocked vehicles are typically crimes of opportunity, while the catalytic converters and air bags are specific and targeted by individuals," he said. "We see more consistent unlocked vehicle thefts, while the targeted thefts may happen in different waves due to the fact that this is a smaller group of individuals committing them."

At the June meeting, an ACPD officer will present specific crime statistics and trends throughout the neighborhood and local area and provide an overview of upcoming safety programs and initiatives. These include a Teen Police Academy this summer, the Public Safety Block Party is on August 27th at Kenmore Middle School and increased opportunities for safety training, especially for children.

Residents will be invited to participate in the discussion with constructive feedback, comments and questions.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

New vendors, a record crowd, and widespread enthusiasm marked opening day at the Fairlington Farmers Market.

It was sometimes hard to tell where the line for one vendor ended and the line for another one began, as patrons reconnected with favorite vendors from last year and checked out four new ones. People just generally seemed so happy to be back at the market.

Last year the market's weekly foot traffic often approached a thousand customers. The crowd on opening day surpassed last year's record.

Building a solid customer base for a vibrant farmers market normally takes several years. It's clear that our market has now become an important established asset in our community.

The market offers a venue for other engaging activities for Fairlingtonians, such as the popular Arlington Art Truck. New partnerships are planned for later in the summer.

The market is also occasionally where you can purchase Fairlington SWAG, particularly Fairlington T-shirts for kids and adults.

FCA launched the process for creating a farmers market in 2013, soliciting the views of residents and exploring options with county staff. We established an exploratory committee to examine how other community markets operate and craft a plan for one in Fairlington.

FCA never intended to be the operator of the market. Instead, we essentially spun it off to Field To Table, a non-profit created by a former Fairlington resident that operates several markets in the area.

But the decisions and the real work of running the market rest with an intrepid group of Fairlington volunteers. They vet the vendors, set the rules, coordinate the special activities, and monitor each week's operation.

Kudos to Melissa Beene, Tracey McGovern, Jeff Kost, Lynne Blasi, Cheryl Goodman, and Robin Habberley. I'm sure they would welcome some help if you can give a few hours each month. Thanks as well to market manager Aisha Salazar and assistant managers Esmeralda Matthews and Liz Mortimer.

The market has also enjoyed the annual support of FCA, Fairlington Dental, Kay Houghton Associates, and Fairlington Presbyterian Church.

The Fairlington Farmers Market is a compelling example of how FCA's leadership helps enhance life in Fairlington. Hope to see you at the market.

2022 election cycle begins in June

The 2022 election cycle begins this month as Arlington voters begin the process of electing a member of Congress, one member of the county board, and one school board member.

Eighth District Cong. Don Beyer is facing a Democratic primary challenge from political newcomer Victoria Virasingh, his first Democratic opponent since being elected eight years ago.

County Board member Matt de Ferranti is unopposed for

re-election in the Democratic primary. He is expected to face independents Adam Theo and Audrey Clement in the November general election.

The Democratic primary is June 21. The congressional race is the only thing on the ballot. Republicans had scheduled a convention for May 21.

North Fairlington residents vote at Abingdon Elementary, while South Fairlington residents vote at the Fairlington Community Center. Fairlington residents who live in Alexandria vote at the NOVA Arts Center. The polls are open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. The eighth congressional district covers all of Fairlington,

In-person voting runs through June 18. Voters may also request a mail ballot through the Virginia Department of Elections website, https://vote.elections.virginia.gov. Voters can request a mail ballot until June 10. Ballots must be mailed or delivered in person by June 21 or mailed with a postmark of June 21 and received by noon on June 24.

In Virginia, school board elections are non-partisan. Candidates run as independents, but they often seek endorsements from the local political parties. The Democrats had planned to hold an in-person caucus over four days in June to determine who gets their endorsement for the school board position currently held by Board President Barbara Kanninen. She is not running for re-election.

Bethany Sutton and Brandon Clark initially sought the Democratic endorsement, but in early May Clark withdrew from the Democratic endorsement process. School, while Rives is co-chair of Arlington Public Schools' School Health Advisory Board.


Giving blood is a simple, non-invasive way to offer a great deal of help to those who need it most.

Due to complications and safety restrictions from the COVID-19 pandemic, the nation is experiencing one of the worst blood shortages in more than a decade. FCA will continue to host blood drives regularly and plans to announce the next opportunity soon.

County board chair discusses budget, missing middle housing, fire station 7, and EV charging stations

The FCA board welcomed Katie Cristol to the monthly May meeting, the first in-person meeting in more than two years. Cristol has been on the county board since 2015 and is currently serving her second term as chair.



She regularly visited Fairlington pre-pandemic, including attending the neighborhood's July 4th parade and candidly admitted that the cherished Fairlington tradition is "the best game in town," among competing July 4 activities across the county.

Cristol's remarks focused on the top county board priorities following the budget, which was adopted in April. She

highlighted two main issues: investing in the county employee workforce and housing.

"We need to invest in people. We want to show the staff we appreciate them," Cristol explained, noting that several positions were hard to fill and experienced continued vacancies. The adopted budget includes merit increases of 5.25 percent for general employees.

The Arlington County Police Department also received recognition for their work and the need to make salaries more competitive. Cristol noted that it is a "scary time for our police department," while also underscoring the importance of community connections and better coordination with the County's Department of Human Services' mental health professionals.

The budget includes a 13.5 percent salary increase to retain and recruit police.

"We don't want a department that can only answer certain calls. We want enough personnel to build relationships," she said.

The budget also calls for an 8.5 percent salary increase for the Arlington County Fire Department.

Housing was the second priority outlined. Cristol acknowledged that the affordability crisis is, in part, the

county's own making by preventing sufficient housing growth.

The budget commits funding for eviction prevention and increasing housing support, with \$14.3 million in housing grant support and \$3.4 million for permanent supportive housing. The budget also includes \$23 million in federal funding for housing choice vouchers and \$18.7 million for the Affordable Housing Investment Fund (AHIF).

Cristol understands that single family homes (SFH) are out of reach for most residents, yet three-quarters of the county is zoned exclusively for SFH. The 18-month study referred to as "Missing Middle," looks at how to strategically create more multi-family units or dwellings on SFH lots with a mix of units.

In essence Cristol commented, "It is trying to bring more Fairlington-type housing to Arlington."

The question is where to build, the environmental impact on sewers, trees, and impervious surfaces, as well as stresses on current county services, including schools. Ultimately, the goal will include "middle class affordable" newly constructed units that are within reach for more Arlington workers including police and teachers.

Director Julie Butler inquired if certain zoning qualifications in Fairlington could be reviewed that would recognize units for additional bedrooms as a creative approach to increasing housing inventory.

She asked if there would be tax credits or grants to make these renovations zoning compliant.

Despite the soggy conditions, the event raised an incredible \$23,000 to help find a cure for 14-year-old Fairlington resident Ellie McGinn who lives with a rare brain and spinal cord condition called LBSL.

A portion of funds raised will also support physical education activities at Abingdon Elementary School.

The first place finisher in the men's category was Greg Piepmeier, who finished in 17 minutes and six seconds. First place in the women's category went to Chelsea Hassett, who also finished strong in 22 minutes and 27 seconds.

A highlight of this year's race was the tribute to longtime Fairlington resident and 5K volunteer Andrew Vitolis, who passed away in 2020. A picture of Andrew, who was famous for wearing a banana costume to each race, was featured on the front of the official 5K t-shirts.
















What do Mosquitoes have to do with Pollinator Week?

June 20-26 is Pollinator Week and we love pollinators. But we're not actually going to talk about pollinators. We're going to talk about mosquitoes, even though most of us wouldn't miss them if they all disappeared.

If we spray pesticide into the environment or use bug zappers, we don't target just mosquitoes. We harm pollinators and many other insects. Pesticides, plus destruction of habitat, landscapes full of non-native plants that insects can't eat, light pollution, and climate change are decimat-

birds in North America now than in 1970, a mere 50 years ago.

Entomologist and wildlife biologist Doug Tallamy puts it this way, "You have total ecosystem collapse if you lose your insects. How much worse can it get than that?"

That's the very bad news. But we can take steps to change the grim reality that is unfolding. And that takes us back to mosquitoes.

Our (understandable) efforts to kill mosquitoes also kill

ing insect populations. An estimated 40 percent (nearly half!) of insect species worldwide are in decline and in danger of extinction.

This spells disaster for humans. Plants convert the sun's energy into a sugar that feeds the plant. It's overwhelmingly insects that then convert that plant into energy usable by other members of the food web – such as insects, birds, amphibians and reptiles, animals, and ultimately people.

Insects also pollinate our food, and insects "clean up" as decomposer insects return nutrients to the soil and the cycle begins again. Insects are the foundation of the ecosystem.

Without insects, what happens? Because of staggering insect declines in China, people are going through orchards to hand pollinate fruit. The food web begins to topple—the other insects and animals that eat insects begin to decline, and the animals that eat them begin to decline, on up the food web —to people.

Close to 96 percent of our birds feed only insects, mostly caterpillars, to their young. There are three billion fewer

pollinators and many other insects. Many pesticides are engineered to stay in the environment to keep killing mosquitoes, so they keep killing other insects.

Instead, we can take actions to target only mosquitoes instead of all insects. Dump the standing water every 7 days (bird baths, buckets, wheelbarrows, pet dishes, plant pot saucers, watering cans, kiddie pools, toys, wagons, tarps), use Bti where we can't dump the water, wear long-sleeved shirts and pants, and use a repellent.

Fans are another great protection against mosquitoes, who are weak flyers. It doesn't take much of a breeze to keep them away. Get a couple fans on your patio or balcony to keep them at bay.

County closes all lanes on Glebe bridge

On May 9 Arlington County closed all the lanes of the West Glebe bridge between Arlington and Alexandria to motor vehicle traffic because of continued degradation of structural beams. The lanes will remain closed while construction of a planned replacement superstructure (road deck and beams) proceeds.

Two motor vehicle lanes on the renovated bridge are expected to reopen in early 2023 along with one of two widened sidewalks. A contract for construction has already been awarded. Arlington County and the City of Alexandria are sharing design and reconstruction costs for the new bridge.

According to the county, pedestrian and bike access on the bridge will stay open through June. A temporary crossing, independent of the superstructure, is expected to open in July 2022 for pedestrian/bike detours.

In addition to the lane closure, the Four Mile Run trail underpass will be closed during construction; a quartermile detour is available on South Glebe Rd. and South Four Mile Run Dr.

A routine inspection of the bridge in November 2018 found structural deterioration, leading Arlington and Alexandria to impose weight restrictions and close the sidewalks on both sides. One southbound lane across the bridge was converted for the exclusive use of people walking and biking.

A similar inspection in fall 2021 found further deterioration, prompting the county to again shift lanes and the temporary walking path. In March the county closed the southbound lane but kept a northbound lane open. Engineers continued to monitor the bridge's structure weekly. That monitoring led to last month's closure.

Traffic is now detoured to the bridge connecting Arlington Ridge Rd. with Mt. Vernon Ave. in Alexandria or along I-395.

The design for the new bridge includes wider sidewalks and separate bicycle facilities on each side of the bridge, in response to community feedback received in January and February 2020.

Reminder: Property taxes due June 15

The due date for the first installment of real estate taxes is Wednesday, June 15. The same date applies to both Arlington County and the City of Alexandria. Real estate bills were mailed in early May.

For customers who are responsible for paying their real estate taxes, Arlington's Customer Assessment and Payment Portal (CAPP) is a convenient way to pay securely online. Even if you do not pay via the internet, CAPP has many other benefits, including reminder emails about upcoming due dates.



Cristol responded that many zoning regulations are state -mandated rather than imposed by the county. Director Diana Bentley pointed out that identical units in the Alexandria part of Fairlington are classified differently than those in Arlington.

Cristol did say the County was looking to change the current zoning law that allows for only 4 unrelated people to share a residence while an unlimited number of related residents can share a unit. Changing the law would allow for more flexibility and reflect the changing concept of what consists of a family unit.

A Fairlington Meadows resident inquired about county plans to support and/or facilitate the installation of electric vehicle (EV) charging stations. "What are the chances that EV stations are coming here?"

The Commons has one EV station and is contemplating more and Fairlington Villages has had two stations for several years.

Cristol responded that the county board is waiting on a study to be released based on two pilot programs. She indicated there should be funds allocated in the 10-year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Priorities have yet to be determined, but she recognized that having EV stations would be desirable for a community.

"We would want to look at how the county would coordinate with HOA's in terms of incentives," she said.

Cristol indicated that further discussion will be needed to determine how payment for charging vehicles would work. She urged the community to follow the CIP work sessions on this issue. The CIP is expected to be adopted in July. FCA President Guy Land asked about the status of the former Station 7, which has been shuttered since 2018 because it was no longer structurally sound for modern fire trucks. In terms of public safety, Ms. Cristol responded that emergency response times have remained stable.

She indicated that there is funding in the CIP for planning on the site's future which would include community engagement. Considerations like the building's age and usability and zoning type need to be reviewed.

Cristol indicated that there may be options for a type of "fast track" planning process that would still include neighborhood input.





DOWN TO EARTH *patio gardening*



Hiding common Fairlington garden eyesores

In any design—interior, exterior or even in a book—eyesores are the first elements that stand out and grab one's attention. I haven't figured out why but they do. There are fixes and this month, I'll advise on a few in your Fairlington patios.

A/C compressor: In about 90 percent of Fairlington patios, this monstrosity is parked outside the kitchen window. And if the unit is modern, it's large, gray, and screams "industrial." Surrounding the unit is a narrow square area of soil usually strewn with weeds. I suggest removing the weeds and applying two solutions: One would be to fill the area with decorative rocks. The other would be to plant ground cover which takes your eye off the compressor without shielding it. Ground cover is smallish, flowers, and is evergreen, which provides a living skirt to the unsightly component.

Tree roots: Lots of patios have the standard "tree in the corner." With the vertical beauty comes root arms that crawl along the soil. Think again about ground cover, which has fibrous roots and easily can be planted between the tree's root arms. Pachysandra (shade), alyssum, ajuga work. The root arms still have a presence but will be accented with flowers and foliage. Another idea is to add reptile figurines. Decorative salamanders or turtles will "crawl" over the tree's root arms. Frogs can "perch" on them. And all will look natural.

Water pooling at gate: Water gathers at any low point and oftentimes it's at the fence gate. This is because the area just outside the gate is higher (in elevation) than the area inside the gate. A solution is to dig a modest drainage bed at the gate exterior. Think about an area 10 inches wide by 4 feet long. Dig out the soil and spread it inside your patio along the fence line. In the new cavity, pour pea gravel. The water should flow beneath the gate into this drainage bed. Check with your condo association.

Fiber-optic tube (Fios): In some villages, it lies on the ground along the side fence. They are gray and 2 inches in diameter. Although they are functional, they are unsightly. Either build up the mulch to hide the tube or plant smallish plants to mask it. Plant suggestions are tiarella, liriope, mazus, brunnera, coral bells, periwinkle or lenten rose.

The fence: Fences are sturdy, functional, and provide privacy. But left alone, they can be stark and boring. Situate specimens that will grow 4–5feet tall to accent this swath of wood. Or install an iron trellis at the fence and on the trellis, train a flowering vine such as clematis, honeysuckle, star jasmine, Carolina jessamine, wisteria or pyracantha. The last two need monitoring since they have woody branches and grow rapidly.

Cement stoop: It's there and not going away! But it's large enough (usually 4-feet by 4-feet or a few inches bigger) to house one or two pots with flowers. Add in trailing specimens (creeping jenny, vinca vine, ivy, asparagus fern) for a fountainous look. These are so much prettier than the welcome mat which collects moisture and doesn't "weather" well in terms of beauty.
