Police urge you to call: Register complaints, report something unusual

At the FCA meeting in February, residents heard the good news that police officers consider Fairlington a "quiet" area, largely untouched by anything approaching double-decibel crime. Law enforcement officers know that quiet now doesn't mean quiet tomorrow, so they continued to urge residents to be vigilant and to report any suspicious or even merely questionable activity. Arlington County Police Captain Brett Butler, commander of the Third District, and Alexandria

Police Department Lieutenant Shirl Mammarella, deputy commander of Sector 3, noted that Larceny from Auto continues to be the statistically most significant crime in Fairlington, as well as in Arlington and Alexandria generally. (In addition, before the officers presented their review of recent crime activity at the meeting, representatives from Arlington's Office of Emergency Management provided an overview of their agency's work in planning and preparedness. *See the box, page 7*).

Captain Butler and Lieutenant Mammarella explained their respective areas of responsibility: Arlington's Third District essentially covers all of south Arlington except for Crystal City; Alexandria's Sector 3 covers the city's "west end," essentially everything west of Quaker Lane. Of foremost interest to Fairlingtonians was gaining clarity on the way the two departments coordinate efforts, particularly as they affect the residents in Fairlington Villages who have Arlington addresses but who actually live in Alexandria. Butler and Mammarella agreed that emergency response should not be a problem; 9-1-1 dispatchers in both jurisdictions use computerized data, based on location, to send first responders.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Thirty-three-year-old Joshua Weissman died on Thursday, February 9.

He was a paramedic with the Alexandria City Fire Department. He was injured the night before, in the line of duty.

According to the *Washington Post*, "Weissman was climbing over a cement barrier along I-395 to get to a burning vehicle Wednesday evening when he fell through a large gap between the barriers and dropped 30 feet into Four Mile Creek, police and fire officials said after the accident."

Think about that: Weissman was trying to get to a burning vehicle. He didn't know if anyone was trapped inside, but it was his obligation that night to rescue all who were inside. The oily fire, the cold rain, the heavy traffic—he was trained to let none of these things interfere with his duty: saving lives.

As it happened, the FCA had invited police representatives from both Alexandria and Arlington to our monthly meeting on that Wednesday night to share updated crime information and crime prevention tips with Fairlingtonians. I've been marveling over the fact that Arlington Captain Brett Butler, Alexandria Lieutenant Shirl Mammarella, and their fellow officers still came to talk with residents about our concerns, when one of their fellow public safety officers was fighting for his life.

That is public service. That is a huge act of generosity.

Please thank your fire fighters, your paramedics and EMTs, and your police officers when you see them.

And please keep Alexandria paramedic Joshua Weissman and his family in your thoughts. Weissman was brave; his last assignment was testament to his character.

One meeting attendee asked about a recent incident: A resident of Fairlington Villages heard what she thought was gunshots (which later turned out to be fireworks). The resident first called Arlington police, was referred to Alexandria police, who referred her back to Arlington police. After the situation was resolved, some residents were left with questions about whom to call. Captain Butler said that he couldn't speak to the particular incident, but that he wanted all residents to feel comfortable calling the Arlington police non-emergency number (703-558-2222). In addition, he provided his e-mail contact information for any resident with a question—about anything law-enforcement or public-safety related, from jurisdictions to traffic issues to suspicious behavior (Bbutle@arlingtonva.us. *NB*: Leave off the "r" in Butler).


In both Arlington and Alexandria, police note a recent increase in the theft of motorcycles. Officers encourage owners to secure their motorcycles with something more than just the factory lock on the ignition. Use an anti-theft device; secure the bike to something stationary with a heavy-duty chain and lock (so that it can't be simply lifted up, for example, and placed in the back of a van). Despite that uptick, and for perspective about crime generally in Arlington, Captain Butler noted the number of homicides last year—zero. The year before, there were two homicides; one was a "domestic," and the other was a robbery gone bad. The overall trend is decidedly in favor of fewer part one (felony) crimes—a trend that mirrors a nationwide decrease in violent and property crimes, as reported by the FBI.

The officers agreed that, in this area, traffic and traffic violations tend to be the most constant source of complaints. Over a six-month period, Butler said that

229 tickets were issued in Fairlington (on the periphery of the neighborhood, inside Fairlington, and down to Walter Reed Drive). Ninety-six were stop sign violations. Traffic enforcement tends to follow areas that generate numerous complaints, both Butler and Mammarella said. Of course, any officer can cite any driver at any time. But enforcement officers can be assigned to monitor a specific intersection when there have been continual complaints about violations in that area. It was recommended that residents call or go online (there are several reporting links on the ACPD Web page) to register complaints about specific locations and problems—for example, the intersection of S. 36th Street and Quaker Lane, where drivers on Quaker routinely ignore signs that say "Do not block the intersection." The same is true when you observe violations at the stop sign intersection of S. 36th Street and S. Taylor—which Butler described as a "hot bed" of violation. In one hour last summer, 30 tickets were issued there. Depending on the volume of complaints registered with police, the areas of enforcement attention will fluctuate.

Gang activity in Arlington is not what it was 10 to 15 years ago, said Butler. It used to be vocal and open, but that has subsided considerably in recent years, due primarily to RICO legislation (the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act) and associated enhanced penalties. At the same time, the Neighborhood Watch program seems to be in decline as a formal entity. Butler believes that's because, particularly in highly-walkable neighborhoods like Fairlington, every person out and about on the sidewalks is essentially "on neighborhood watch." Every mom with a cell phone pushing a stroller is on neighborhood watch. So is every dog-walker, jogger, bike rider, and person waiting at the bus stop.

In conclusion, said Butler, "our goal is to fix problems." Residents are advised to stay vigilant and to let police know of problems. If you see something odd, puzzling, or questionable, don't hesitate to call the police nonemergency numbers (Arlington, 703-558-2222; Alexandria, 703-838-4444). As Butler noted, "We can come check it out. We're glad to come check it out. It's what we do. It gives us contact, and this contact might lead to something else." If, for example, you see people walking down a line of cars, looking inside, maybe touching door handles, call. If you see something strange, or if you smell something you think is marijuana, or, particularly late at night, if you see/hear/smell/encounter anything out of the ordinary, call. The police realize that by the time they get there, the potential bad actor might be gone; but your call gives them information about a location, to which they can return. In short, when in doubt-call.

CivFed meeting addresses stormwater concerns

At the February meeting of the Arlington County Civic Federation, staff from the Department of Environmental Services discussed the county's stormwater and watershed improvement plans:

- Stormwater and sanitary sewer drains are on completely separate systems in Arlington (unlike in many other jurisdictions). All stormwater goes (eventually) directly into the Potomac and the Chesapeake Bay without being treated.
- Most of Arlington was developed before stormwater regulations existed, so county streams are heavily impacted by stormwater runoff.
- More than half of the county's stormwater network is over 50 years old.
- Federal and state regulations have strengthened the controls on stormwater runoff, including new regs last year.
- The county is improving existing stormwater facilities that focus on natural treatment of stormwater, upgrading the infrastructure, imposing new restrictions on runoff from impervious surfaces in new development, and upgrading the county's stormwater master plan.
- Pet waste is the number one source of e-coli bacteria in Arlington streams.
- The county is establishing a StormwaterWise Landscape program, selecting 40 pilot participants who will work with the county to identify strategies to reduce stormwater runoff from their properties. The program will have matching grants to implement the improvements.

The winner of the special election will succeed Barbara Favola, who resigned from the board after winning a seat in the state Senate. The deadline for registering to vote in the special election is Monday, March 12. OEM's good advice on how to get prepared, stay informed

Representatives from Arlington's Office of Emergency Management, Lissa Westerman and Robb Hoffower, explained how OEM acts as a coordinating office for planning and preparedness for any large or complex event, so that all county departments know their roles in an emergency. An emergency might be a weather event, like a severe summer storm or extreme winter temperatures or snowfall; an extended period of power outage; a terrorist event that might

be a cyber attack or that might require hazmat or public health responses or calls for evacuation; or a large accident involving a chemical spill or mass injuries. OEM does not respond directly to the event—police and fire departments do that. Rather, OEM conducts prior planning to anticipate needs and identify resources to contribute to the response. On a day-to-day basis, OEM operates the county's emergency communications networks (9-1-1 dispatch) and conducts outreach among county officials and regional agencies.

OEM's best advice for residents, which echoes that of federal and state agencies and the Red Cross, is: Be informed. Make a plan. Get involved. And the OEM recommends these things for you to do now to step-up your personal preparedness. Sign up for ArlingtonAlert; you can tailor the list to the kinds of alerts you want to receive and on which devices. Download OEM's smart phone app, Arlington Prepares, and enter your emergency information there. Become familiar with Arlington's emergency radio station and with the wealth of readiness publications and resource referrals OEM has to offer. Work resumes at the S. 32nd Street tree stand, March 31



If you've observed the uniformly brown and barren tree stand along S. 32nd Street this winter, take note of how things begin to green up this month. Fairlington resident Lenny Bankester, who organized work days at the tree stand throughout last year, will return on Saturday, March 31, for a renewed effort at removing invasive species like English ivy and Japanese honeysuckle. Join the neighborhood's band of

volunteer weed pullers, from about 9 to 11 am—you'll be among the first this year to poke about the naturalized area and see what plants are coming up. Neighbors may be joined by some of Bankester's classmates in Tree Steward training. In addition, there may be a few Virginia Tech students, who currently are taking a class in invasive species, and to whom Bankester made a presentation about the ongoing reclamation work in Fairlington. Bring gloves. No experience required.

Become a Fairlington volunteer: Here's a callout to all Fairlington residents, to join in the fun and make a difference, at two of the neighborhood's traditional events.



For Fairlington Day, which will be held on the second Saturday in May in conjunction with the county's annual Neighborhood Day, you can sign up to organize an activity, like a kids' craft, face-painting, balloon filling, or music making.

Or choose a time slot for flipping burgers. Or take charge of corralling a collection of coolers and then getting and toting ice. Be the wrangler for napkins, paper plates, and plastic forks. Any and all contributions are welcome. (All products are paid for by FCA.)

For the 4th of July parade and after-party, FCA is thinking of expanding the parade route to include a southern loop, so that the parade can proceed from the Fairlington Community Center, over the bridge and past the firehouse, to the after-party in the parking lot of the North Fairlington Community Center. Sewer work update

Part two of the sanitary sewer infrastructure project is scheduled to begin by early March, according to the county's Department of Environmental Services. During construction, a portion of S. Utah Street, near Utah Park, from a point north of 32nd Road S. to 32nd Street S. will be blocked off and closed to traffic. Barring weather delays, the work is expected to take about six months.



Spring forward, March 11

At 2 am on Sunday, March 11, set your clocks ahead to 3 am for the start of Daylight Saving Time. The annual "spring forward" time change effectively moves an hour of daylight from the morning to the evening. DST, called "summer time" in Britain, has been observed in much of the U.S., Canada, and Europe since World War I. As prescribed in the Energy Policy Act of 2005, the duration of DST has expanded by about four weeks, now beginning on the second Sunday in March and ending on the first Sunday in November. In January and February, Fairlington residents may have noticed a man walking around the neighborhood paying close attention to the street trees. He would stop at a tree, look, enter notes on his electronic tablet, look again, take more notes, perhaps touch the tree's bark or inspect a damaged area, and then move on to the next tree. Repeat. That was Vincent Verweij, Arlington's Arborist from the Department of Parks and Recreation, carrying out Fairlington's segment of the county's tree inventory.

This year, Arlington will conduct a comprehensive survey of the county's approximately 20,000 street trees—trees in the public right-of-way, which the county owns and maintains along the streets and in street-adjacent grassy areas. (The survey does not include trees in parks, on school grounds, or on other public properties. Including all trees on public and private property, DPR estimates that there are about 200,000 specimens in the county's urban forest canopy.) With iPad in hand, Verweij will spend fair weather days for much of the year assessing street trees; he will confirm the

species and location, gauge the diameter and height, check for any problems or distinguishing features, and assess the specimen's overall health and condition. Ultimately, Verweij will account for every street tree in Arlington.

The data being collected now in 2012 can be compared to what was recorded from a previous tree inventory in 2003, but this year's survey will be aided in accuracy and comprehensiveness by technology. For the earlier survey, tree examiners went into the field carrying very large paper maps; they made notations that then would be transcribed and entered into a database back in the office. With his tablet, Verweij can consult a GPS supported electronic map, with all the locator and viewing function of Google mapping, and he can enter his findings directly into the database on the spot. The new database will enable county arborists and landscapers easily to track trends in species health, check for species diversity, assess locations that are doing well or poorly, identify problem species, identify vacant locations for planting, and target certain areas or species for monitoring or stepped-up maintenance. Verweij originally envisioned the inventory as a single-handed, year-long project, but recently he was pleased to receive offers of assistance from Master Gardeners of Northern Virginia and Tree Stewards of Arlington and Alexandria. With a trained cadre of knowledgeable and similarly equipped volunteers, Verweij anticipated that he might complete the survey by the summer.

By early last month, Verweij had arrived at some conclusions: Notably, Fairlington's street trees have undergone change in the last ten years, and the most significant event affecting street trees here was the microburst storm of August 2010. There are now many young replacement trees planted among some of the neighborhood's 60- and 70-year-old oaks. One section of S. 34th Street, planted with a willow oak, a linden tree, and a pin oak, offered some interesting evidence of how the street trees are doing. The willow oak, a "teenage" tree, perhaps five years in the ground, was doing well, despite some severe weather conditions in the last few years (particularly summer drought). The pin oak, staked and supported, was a replacement tree planted in the aftermath of the 2010 storm. It, too, was doing well—even though it retains a covering of brown leaves that make it seem more lifeless than would bare branches. Verweij pointed out that the juvenile pin oak typically holds onto its dead leaves throughout the winter. In this case, brown leaves are not a sign of ill health; rather they're a young pin oak's natural defense against sun scald (see the box, below).

The linden tree, oldest of the three, was not faring as well. The bark is split and there's evidence of heavy pruning—probably in response to limbs broken in the 2010 storm. Most significant, the diameter reveals less than optimal growth. A tree's diameter is measured at roughly chest height, about four and a half feet from the ground. In 2003, the linden's diameter was recorded as 3 inches. Today, it's about 6 inches—not as much of an increase as one would hope for in ten years. A standard arboriculture rating system assigns numbers for overall

Defense against sun scald: The USDA describes sun scald as damage to a tree's bark and trunk that can occur on warm winter days, due to intense light, often reflected off snow, during the dormant season. Sometimes called southwest injury, sun scald usually occurs on the southwest side of young trees. A juvenile tree's retention of dead leaves throughout the winter can act as a shield against sun scald. The dead leaves remain attached to the shoots until new leaves appear in the spring.

tree health on a scale from 0 (essentially dead) to 100, and a rating of 70 to 80 is considered good for street trees. In 2003, the linden's overall condition was rated 70. Today, Verweij gives it a 50.

Despite the ups and downs of various street trees in Fairlington, Verweij credited the community's parklike setting and physical layout for actually supporting street tree health. Street trees, generally, he noted, are at a disadvantage because of the physical environment of surrounding hardscape—paving, concrete, and other impervious surfaces—so that tree roots between the sidewalk and curb soon run up against a hard barrier. But Fairlington's long stretches of uninterrupted grassy areas in the public right-of-way at least provide the trees with some lateral "elbow" room. Today, the typical life of a street tree is about 10 years; for Fairlington plantings, Verweij expects an extended survival period.

There's additional good news in Fairlington's eight Notable trees and one Champion tree—the blackjack oak on the grounds of the Fairlington Community Center, where it stands on its own, just to the right of the building and next to the parking lot. A champion is simply the largest specimen of its species in the county. As a general rule, forest trees of equal age will be taller, thinner, and have a smaller crown compared to counterparts grown in more open environments. The Champion blackjack oak, about 70 feet tall, is distinguishable by its very dark, almost black, bark, and its gnarly branches. Watch for the leaves to come out this spring—elongated and broadening at the end, they resemble the shape of a leather truncheon or blackjack.

New name for Parks and Rec: The county's Department of Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Resources has shortened its name to the Department of Parks and Recreation. In acronym-speak, the old PRCR becomes the new DPR.

DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



Plants respond to warmer winter temperatures

"Global warming" prompts two thoughts: Is it a reality and how do plants respond?

Scientists and climatologists continue their research to determine an answer to the former. In December, 2011, for example, the *New York Times* reported that carbon dioxide emissions increased a record 5.9 percent in 2010, according to the Global Carbon Project, a consortium of international scientists.

While conclusions are still debated, we do know the weather this winter is warmer than what one expects, and the warmer temperatures affect plants. Here are some observed examples of how plants respond to recent temperature fluctuations.

Flower bloom times have accelerated. In early February, I noticed periwinkle blooming in Fairfax. Normally, that blooms in summer. I also saw the perennial columbine showing a yellow flower in late January. That usually blooms in the spring. Mahonia used to show its yellow flower in late January, but I saw some out in December. The same is true with winter jasmine, another winter bloomer with a yellow flower. And clematis, normally a summer-blooming flowering vine, was out in mid-January. Even some Yoshino cherry trees along West Braddock Road in Alexandria were in full bloom in early January. Usually, the Yoshino shows its flower in mid- to late March.

More curiosities to ponder: Three

years ago (late December 2008), I installed an evergreen landscape in south Arlington. All plantings were juniper, a bristly-foliated shrub that tolerates heat, pollution, and drought. But in order to dig a hole, I had to use an iron bar to break through four to five inches of frozen soil. Below that crust was soft loam. However, three months ago (December, 2011), soil everywhere locally was malleable enough to turn over by using a pitchfork and a trowel, simply because warmer tempera-

tures had softened the dirt.

This past December was the warmest on record in our area with an average temperature of 45 degrees. January was not a record, but it was still warm enough to see the occasional jogger in T-shirt and shorts, as well as gardeners out tilling their gardens for "spring." So far in 2012, there has been an abundance of days in the mid-50s. On January 31, it was 65 degrees. A day later, it warmed to 74.

On January 25, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a slight northward change in its plant hardiness zone mapping. Our zone is 6B-7. Previously, for that zone, the northernmost geographic area in which a crape myrtle could be planted with hopes of survival was the Philadelphia area. But with the hardiness zone adjustment, gardeners in the more northern Pennsylvania cities of Scranton and Stroudsburg just might be able to plant a crape myrtle and see it thrive.

Regarding our warm winter, people may wonder, "Is it safe to plant now or should I wait until spring?" The safe bet is to wait until late March when threat of frost has passed. But I found it practical to plant evergreens (with woody as opposed to fibrous roots) in January and February. Yes, the planting time was accelerated, but so was our warmer weather.




