County demographer to address FCA



FCA is a census partner in the Arlington Census 2020 efforts. Elizabeth Hardy, Principal Planner and Demographer for Arlington county, will address the Fairlington Citizens Association (FCA) at their monthly meeting on March 11. Hardy will discuss the upcoming 2020 census and give background information on how the census will be conducted and why it is so important for everyone to be counted.

As part of her presentation, Hardy plans to discuss demographic changes in Arlington county and how those changes have the potential to impact various countywide policies. Changes in population can affect how the county decides infrastruc-

ture projects, transportation initiatives, and public school catchment areas.

The U.S. Census counts every resident in the United States. Article I, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution mandates that this occur every 10 years.

The results of the census inform various policies at the county, state, and federal levels of government. The information the census collects helps determine how more than \$675 billion of federal funding is distributed to states and communities each year.

The census is conducted through various means and temporary workers have already been hired to assist in the effort. Invitations to participate will be mailed out to every residential address starting in mid-March.

The census officially begins on April 1 and people can start responding to the census online, by phone, or paper starting as early as March 12, 2020. For those who do not respond in a timely manner, they will receive a visit from a census worker who will be tasked with interviewing households to ensure that everyone is counted accurately and completely.

Elizabeth Hardy has served as the County Demographer since 2017; she has been with the Arlington County Department of Planning, Housing, and Development since 2008. She has a Masters in Urban and Regional Planning from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

Topics that Hardy plans to cover include 2010 Census Demographics, 2018 ACS Socioeconomic Demographics, 2020 Population Estimates, Population Projections, and the 2020 Census.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

At February's FCA meeting, leaders of the Shirlington Civic Association briefed us on the proposal to provide additional density there.

The Village at Shirlington is roughly 30 years old. Property owner Federal Realty Investment Trust (FRIT) wants to reinvest in Shirlington, while preserving the small-town character of Campbell Ave. To make that work financially, FRIT needs to build on land it owns. And for the businesses there to thrive, they need additional customers, which more density would yield.

Without the ability to address these twin challenges, deteriorating facades and vacant storefronts could make Shirlington far less attractive in future years, something that's not in Fairlington's interest.

FCA understands the importance of maintaining Shirlington as a vibrant commercial area. It's part of the extended Fairlington neighborhood. Our residents shop there, frequent the restaurants, go to Signature Theatre. We want the businesses to thrive. At the same time, we know the concern our residents have about additional density.

Our discussion identified three broad considerations:

First, improvements should include making Shirlington more accessible to Fairlington residents. There are already plans to enhance pedestrian access down 31st St., but additional steps are needed to facilitate vehicle, pedestrian, and bike access down Quaker Ln.

Second, a discussion of increased density should include a hard look at traffic impacts, not just in Shirlington itself but in the surrounding neighborhoods. As Shirlington becomes a more popular destination, our streets will likely become more congested.

Finally, in considering changes in Shirlington, the county needs to look more broadly at a larger geographic area that includes both North and South Fairlington, as well as Parkfairfax and adjacent parts of Alexandria. Developments in Shirlington will not happen in a vacuum.

It isn't just the impact of additional density in Shirlington. Rather, it's the cumulative impact of Shirlington density, combined with the proposal to double the density in Park Shirlington, along with the new development at West Alex, the conversion of the two Park Center office buildings to apartments, and the revitalization of Green Valley. All of those will likely feed off of each other, with implications for Fairlington.

FCA representatives attend the county's work sessions on Shirlington, and we will encourage participants to expand their analysis beyond the narrow confines of Shirlington's boundaries.

Fairlington real estate assessments outpace county-wide increase

Property values for most Fairlington models in Arlington outpaced the county-wide increase in residential real estate assessments for 2020, with some units experiencing increases more than twice the rate across the county.

Overall the total assessed value of all residential and commercial property in Arlington increased by 4.6 percent, compared to 3.5 percent last year. Commercial properties saw the largest gain at 4.9 percent overall, while residential properties increased 4.3 percent.

A spot check of almost 20 different Fairlington models revealed that all of them showed assessment increases above the county average.

The one-bedroom Braddock, with 761 square feet, led the way, showing an increase of 10.1 percent. Other models showing significant increases included the Edgewood and the Georgetown, with increases near or above eight percent.

The large—and rare—Arlington unit, with 2145 square feet, continued to have the highest valuation, shattering the \$600,000 barrier for the first time. The assessment was \$631,800, an increase of almost seven percent, or \$41,100.

A large Dominion I (1800 square feet) in North Fairlington also broke through the \$600,000 mark, with an assessment of \$605,400. Other Dominion models comfortably exceeded the \$500,000 level. No other models in the sample had assessments higher than \$500,000.

Assessments for selected Clarendon I models (1500 square feet), which predominate in South Fairlington, and the smaller Clarendon II's (1383 square feet), which are common in North Fairlington, showed increases ranging from 5.6 percent to 6.9 percent. The assessment for selected Clarendon I's was \$495,800, while the assessment for selected Clarendon II's was \$455,900.

The assessments for individual units of the same model can vary, depending on location and whether they have undergone major renovation work.


According to the county, the average home value in Arlington, including condominiums, townhouses, and detached houses is \$686,300.

Last fall the county board directed the county manager to prepare a budget for the coming year that contains no increase in the real estate tax rate. Of course, the increase in valuations means that homeowners' taxes will rise, even if the rate remains unchanged.

According to a county press release, the increase in commercial property values was driven by a decline in the office vacancy rate, continued new construction, demand for rental properties, and Amazon-related leasing activity. Apartment property values, for example, increased 8.9 percent while office values grew by 2.5 percent.

Real estate assessments are based on previous sales figures, so they may lag behind current resale prices. Residential assessments are based primarily on neighborhood sales occurring from September 1, 2018, through August 31, 2019. Assessments for specific units may not reflect the current fair market value for that unit as determined by the marketplace. This may be particularly true for Fairlington units that have had major internal improvements.

Bus riders: take the bus survey by March 2

As part of the Metro budget process, there is a proposal to restructure and/or cancel several Metrobus lines that serve Fairlington. Public comments are due by 5 pm on March 2.

If you are a bus rider that would be affected by the proposed changes, please complete the WMATA survey available here: https://www.wmata.com/initiatives/bud-get/. It is the best method for public input.

FCA will be submitting written comments citing concerns with the proposals as well. FCA is collaborating with Arlington county and our neighbors in Shirlington and Parkfairfax on the proposals.

Below is a summary of the proposed changes; any service changes proposed by WMATA would go into effect by about July 1:

- Metrobus Route 7Y, which serves North Fairlington, is proposed to terminate at the Pentagon instead of going into DC to Farragut Square. Riders would need to transfer to Metrorail instead.
- During peak hours, Metrobus Route 22C would be replaced by additional 22F trips which would keep the current 10-minute headway between buses in South Fairlington. This is a minor change for most

and could offer improved schedule reliability. However, there are some riders who prefer the current 22C route to avoid crowding on the 7 route. Also, there would not be direct bus service from Fairlington to Ballston.

• Metrobus 22A and 22C service would be cancelled for off-peak hours and weekends. Ridership is low in South Fairlington during the off-peaks, but the community has long enjoyed access to/from Metrorail provided by this service. During off peak hours, bus service would be available with a walk to the 7 route in North Fairlington, as well as the Alexandria DASH bus service at Bradlee Center or Parkfairfax.

Fairlington says goodbye to friend and leader

Andrew Vitols passed away on February 3 after a courageous two-and-a-halfyear battle with cancer. He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth Lyons, his children Eleanor (12) and Ned (10) and his parents. Andrew was a celebrity among the youngest of Fairlingtonians, evidenced by an almost cult-like following on the playground, along the streets, or in the halls of Abingdon.

Hailing from Michigan, and a diehard Wolverines fan, Andrew and his wife called Fairlington home for fifteen years. As a stay-at-home parent, Andrew was the first "dad" member of the Fairlington MOMS Club. He was an active volunteer at the Fairlington Creative Preschool (FPC) where his children attended.

In 2012, Andrew became an integral voice within the Abingdon community, first as a volunteer and then assuming the leadership position as PTA co-president in 2014. He served on the school renovation project's

Building Level Planning Committee and played an important role in the early planning stages of the Fairlington 5K.

Andrew was most recognizable as Abingdon's Cardinal mascot and, in subsequent years, "Mr. Banana Man." Despite his illness, Andrew would do his best to attend neighborhood events. He could be seen giving runners high fives along the 2019 Fairlington 5K route. When people remarked at his presence, he simply replied; "Of course. Banana Man can't be stopped."

Whether it was his shocking pink, green, or orange hair (depending on the season), his infectious spirit to bring joy, or his commitment to serve, he will be dearly missed by all who knew him.

City of Alexandria responds to FCA on King St. project

For the past year, the FCA has been closely following the progress of a series of potential improvements that were proposed along the King St. corridor between Quaker Ln. and I-395. The proposed improvements included landscaping and beautification projects but also drainage solutions, stormwater management, and remediation of potentially hazardous intersections.

Following a series of discussions, the FCA sent a letter to the City of Alexandria outlining several concerns, and asking for an update on the status and timeline of the project.

"The area currently suffers from poor drainage, frequent trash, and damaged trees," wrote FCA President Guy Land. "It is both unsightly and a potential health hazard. It's not a very welcoming introduction to the City of Alexandria and our community."

Land went on to write, "We understand the logic of deferring landscaping enhancements until stormwater work is accomplished, but delays in addressing the stormwater management issues also result in deferred decisions on landscaping."

On January 24, 2020, the City of Alexandria responded with a letter from Yon Lambert, Director of Transportation & Environmental Services (T&ES). Mr. Lambert said he would instruct T&ES staff to inventory street signs and replace any signs that were faded or otherwise in need of repair. He also responded that he would direct the City Arborist to ensure that trees were properly trimmed to ensure adequate lines of sight.

Mr. Lambert went on to say, "I do not, unfortunately, have a clear answer for you on your request to designate this corridor for major capital investment...the City's 10-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) does not include any designated projects for this part of King St. and staff is not recommending any changes at this time."

The Animal Welfare League of Arlington (AWLA) is here to help with any and all animal related matters, including everything from stray dogs to injured wildlife. AWLA provides Animal Control services to Arlington County and is reachable at (703) 931-9241 24 hours a day/365 day a year.

Here are some other local resources and information you may need as a pet owner in Arlington county:

• Looking for a place to tire out your pup? There are eight off-leash dog parks available in Arlington County. These are the only areas in which your dog is permitted to be off-leash. Utah Dog Park and Shirlington Dog Park are the closest parks to many of us, but a full list of all dog parks and regulations can be found at https:// parks.arlingtonva.us/ parksfacilities/dog-parks/.

- When out and about with your dog, please help us protect the environment by always cleaning up after your pet. Bag dog waste and place it in one of the many trash bins around Fairlington. Pet waste makes our streams unsafe for human contact and increases the cost to treat our drinking water.
- For the safety of your pet, yourself, and the people around you, please use a leash. It is against the law to allow dogs to run loose on public property or the private property of others. Dogs must be restrained by a physical leash and under the control of a responsible person when on public property. The owners of dogs found running at large can be cited, fined, or held liable for any damage caused by their pet.

Fairlington ranked as a top real estate market

A report released by Redfin in December ranks Fairlington in the top 20 of the most competitive neighborhoods in the nation for real estate sales in 2019. This study used a combination of data that included factors like sales to list price ratio and days on market for January to November in 2019. According to the report, Fairlington had a 101.8% sales to list price and median of 7 days actively on the market to rank as the 18th most competitive neighborhood across the country. Redfin also used their own internal data to further create their evaluative criteria.

Fairlington was one of two neighborhoods from the DC Metro real estate market represented in the ranking. AU Park/Friendship Heights in northwest DC was ranked 7th. The Bay Area in California had the highest number of neighborhoods in the study, followed by the Boston area.






Depending on March's unpredictable weather, we are a few weeks away from spring plantings. Sometimes, we can plant mid-month. But with snowfall and frost still a possibility, it's smart to wait until April 1 to don the garden gloves and jab the shovel into the soil for new plant holes.

Nurseries delay showcasing plant inventories this month for fear of their plants freezing. Not all garden centers have heated bubbles or houses where plants are stored in winter. While shrubs and trees will be for sale April 1, annuals such as impatiens and begonias won't appear until mid-April.

So, what might you, the gardener, do in March?

Cleaning up the soil space and ridding your garden of eyesores is project Number One. This spring cleaning prepares your layout for rejuvenating plants (perennials) and new plantings. With clean, open spaces, you'll have a clear idea of what plant goes where. Below are some de-cluttering ideas:

Pots: Over winter, containers become filled with dead leaves, weeds and compacted soil. Remove everything, add pebbles at the base for drainage, and fill the pot with fresh soil conditioner, which is more loamlike than topsoil, which can form in clods. If you have plastic containers with plastic hangars, re-use them in the same fashion (as long as they aren't cracked from winter freezes).

"wild" meaning growing or reaching where they need not be, such as a rosebush's thorny branch stretching across the wooden gate or kitchen storm door. Since many shrubs' branches tangle, locate the branch crotch and prune one of two twisted branches. This leaves a cleaner, open appearance.

A specimen's lowest branches that droop to the ground may "re-root" in the soil and re-grow. Uproot these colonizers and then go to the crotch (maybe at the trunk) to make your cut. Why? There's no need for branches of a small tree or shrub to drag the ground. Cluttered branching prevents air flow and invites moisture build-up in the form of fungus, mold, and mildew. In addition, dead leaves and debris collect here. And critters find this mini "fort" a nesting place.

Renewal pruning: Perennials can be "tidied up" now, so prune old flower stalks. On black-eyed Susan, purple coneflower, columbine, hosta, and sedum, these spent, brown leaders still stand tall while the basal (lower) foliage remains evergreen. On vines, prune spent growth but leave the base of the plant undisturbed. In time, the plant's new, green growth emerges and twines upward.

Mulched areas: With a trowel, trench out the outer bed edge and distribute this soil to the back of the bed (at the fence). Creating this conduit prevents mulch or soil erosion onto your concrete, brick or flagstone patio. Once cleaned out, spread a light coating of new mulch here. Next, dig out all the weeds or crabgrass that has invaded your garden. With a clean soil area, your perennials and new plantings will have an undisturbed area in which to grow.

Hardscapes: Where either sand or stone dust (malleable substances) lie between bricks or flagstones, tree seedlings or weeds may appear due to wind or bird droppings. Take a screwdriver and groove out these areas to remove the weeds which never root deeply. Then replace this area with fresh sand or stone dust. If the area in the seams is mortar (and it's cracked), scrape it out and add new mortar mix (bag or tube). If you have flagstone (which is gray), buy mortar mix that's been dyed gray. If that's not available, buy a small can of gray paint to mix in with the mortar which will match the flagstone's gray color. White lines between gray flagstones are unsightly.




