# Libby Garvey to report on APS's wealth of students—they test schools capacity

Finding room for 5,000 more students over the next five years is the primary challenge facing Arlington Public Schools, according to county school board members who reviewed the topic for the Arlington Civic Federation this spring. At the May FCA meeting, School Board Chair Libby Garvey will provide further details about schools capacity, the major issue affecting APS, as well as share insights about the new Superintendent, APS's investments in instruction, and plans for the new Wakefield High School.

Enrollment in K through 12 is projected to grow from 21,000 this year to 26,000 by 2016, significantly exceeding the current capacity of the school system. APS

projections indicate that in just two years, there will be 834 more students than seats, and that increase will climb to 3,300 more students than seats in 2016. Enrollment at Abingdon Elementary is projected to grow from 552 students this fall to 629 in the fall of 2016, an increase of 14 percent. "Essentially, we're growing by one elementary school per year," said Garvey of APS.

The boom in enrollment reflects a variety of residential and demographic trends, including continued county growth, more children being born in the county, and more families with small children staying in the county rather than moving away as their children reach school age. To address the capacity challenge, the school board will look at a range of options, like increasing class sizes, relying on more "relocatables," or trailers, using different configurations of space, and potentially constructing one or more new schools. As ever, the difficulty is funding and coordinating the needs for capital investment across all county departments and projects, Garvey said.

A Fairlington resident for more than 30 years, Garvey served as president of the Abingdon PTA when her children were in school. She joined the school board fifteen years ago and has served as Chair four times. Currently, she is a candidate for the Virginia Senate in the 30th district.

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fairlingtonians,

Fairlington lies in Arlington County—but not entirely. As most people know, a curious bit of boundary-drawing lands a few blocks of Fairlington Villages in the City of Alexandria. My house, right on the 30th Street circle, is in Arlington, but my neighbors on the other side of Columbus Street find themselves in Alexandria.

Does this really matter? For internal Fairlington issues, no, it does not matter at all. The condo association and the Fairlington Citizens Association both serve all Fairlington residents equally. However, I have been observing how elected officials in both jurisdictions look out for the issues of concern to Fairlington residents, and I do see a difference.

In March, I applauded the decision of the Virginia Department of Transportation to drop plans to convert the successful HOV lanes (high occupancy vehicle) on I-395 into HOT lanes (high occupancy toll). This ill-conceived plan would have imposed hardship on car poolers and those of us who ride the bus as well as increase cut-through traffic on local streets and endanger pedestrian safety. In that column I praised Arlington's elected leadership for filing a lawsuit that forced state and federal agencies to re-examine the issue more carefully. Alexandria declined to join the lawsuit.

In April I outlined the problems that the BRAC 133 complex will bring because of inadequate transportation planning and a terrible choice of location for the entire project. (See the update on page 15.) What I should have added is that Alexandria's elected officials, sadly, did not adopt the same wise approach that their counterparts in Arlington have taken on issues like this.

Arlington took the State to court over HOT lanes rather than lie down and let people in the outer suburbs pave over our area so they could have an autobahn. Alexandria welcomed BRAC on Seminary Road, even though there was an alternate site that provided better access to public transportation and avoided many of the problems we are now facing. Reportedly, the city's goal was to keep the new construction (and its potential revenue stream) inside Alexandria at all costs, and common sense be damned. The city did not stand up for smart growth, development congruent with public transportation, or the reduction of traffic impacts.

We can only hope they act with more wisdom in the future, and that they learn from their counterparts in Arlington.

### Mary Hynes reports encouraging budget news

Fresh from budget deliberations, Arlington County Board Vice Chair Mary Hynes spoke at the FCA meeting in April. The biggest news, and the happiest for Arlington County homeowners, was that the real estate (RE) tax rate would remain flat—that is, the rate would not be increased over last year's rate for RE taxes paid in calendar year 2011. (See the box, below.) Because of the

county's overall improved financial outlook, said Hynes, "we will be in a position, in fiscal year 2012, to maintain the safety net and help people in need, in addition to meeting all our other commitments."

Among other budget items of interest, Hynes noted that the board would make a "modest restoration" of operating hours at branch libraries: At the Shirlington and Columbia Pike libraries, three hours one day a week would be

restored, and the branches would be open an additional four hours on Sundays. Also, some funding was restored for park maintenance and tree planting.

One new pilot program has exciting potential to help alcohol-abusing kids, Hynes believes. Survey data from middle- and high-school students reported an increase in binge drinking—higher than in surrounding areas and higher than the national incidence. Examining the survey's findings, the board uncovered the fact that there is a general reluctance to "lower the boom" the first time a teen or pre-teen is caught drinking. Primarily, there was no systematic, well-thought-out way to deal appropriately with, say, an inebriated 15-year-old kid. The pilot program offers an aggressive early intervention, which coordinates the efforts of the police, courts, schools, and families, and which includes education, assessment, and parent participation. Perhaps most important, the intervention is activated the very first time a kid gets caught. The county is committed to two years of the pilot program, so that there will be sufficient time to gather data and do a thorough review of the program's effectiveness in advance of budget deliberations for FY2014.

Hynes also spoke about projects in the CIP, or Capital Improvement Plan. One in particular, the Columbia Pike streetcar line, has recently evolved and gained wider interest among neighboring jurisdictions. Northern Virginia Community College, in Alexandria, has proposed that some land it owns be provided for the streetcar's terminus, "bus barn," and maintenance facility. The line

would begin at NOVA, then run westward along Route 7/King Street, connect with Columbia Pike, run east along the Pike to the Pentagon and Pentagon City, extend via a completed 12th Street to Crystal Drive, and then run south to Potomac Yard and into Alexandria. The simple idea, with, of course, complex construction requirements, is to help people get around and connect neighborhoods with dependable transport.

### Real estate tax rate does not increase

Arlington's real estate (RE) tax rate for calendar year 2011 will not change from CY 2010's rate of 95.8 cents per \$100 of assessed value, according to final budget guidance issued by the County Board last month. (Last year, the RE tax rate was increased 8.3 cents.) This year, County Manager Barbara Donnellan had proposed that the tax rate hold steady, but the board had considered a rate increase—the slightly higher rate "advertised" in February. In April, the board had the option to approve their advertised rate or a lower rate (but not a higher one). RE tax bills will be mailed this month; first installment payments are due in June. Even without an increase in the RE tax rate, county revenues will be bolstered in fiscal year 2012 by a 6.3 percent rise in property assessments, which reflect "market values" and are set on January 1 every year by the Assessor's Office. FY2012 begins on July 1, 2011.

#### Firehouse facts

At the March FCA meeting, Arlington County Fire Department Captain Rudy Eversburg described the kinds of calls Fairlington's Fire Station 7 responds to.

Last year, there were 1,547 calls, which averages out to about four runs per day: 2 % were for fires; 61% were EMS runs (all ACFD firefighters are EMT-Bs, basic life support); 7% were public service calls (e.g., for slip-and-falls when, say, a person falls and can't get up); 8% were good intent calls; 12 % were false alarms; 7% were miscellaneous.

Captain Eversburg noted that people often apologize when the call turns out to be a false alarm or something less than an emergency. His response: Call 911. Don't hesitate to call. ACFD much prefers that you do call

rather than wait and wonder if a situation will develop into an emergency.

It's interesting to know that the Fairlington firehouse is uniquely placed to provide mutual aid to Alexandria. In fact, 65% of the station's call volume and work involves Alexandria; 35% is in Arlington. Of course, the local area is still well covered when Engine 107 responds to an Alexandria call. Captain Eversburg noted that Fire

Station 9, on Walter Reed Drive, is frequently less than 60 seconds behind Fairlington firefighters when both respond to an incident south of here.

House fires today most commonly involve space heaters during the winter months. The reason is that in older homes, the electrical wiring is older, and older wiring cannot support the demands of these appliances. Which points to a basic safety concern for those of us who live in homes built during World War II where we use more and more electrical appliances. Captain Eversburg's recommendations come not only from expertise but also from the experience of doing a home kitchen remodel: Have your wiring checked and "up your amps." Don't overload elec-

trical outlets. Use surge protectors that can be switched on and off. Do not use cheap extension cords, because the quality of wiring is important. An overloaded wire is a hot wire—and it will fail.

## Facelift for neighborhood streets

The county's Department of Environmental Services will conduct milling and paving operations on certain Fairlington streets during the summer street repair program.

- South Stafford, from the South 32nd Road intersection (one block from Quaker Lane) to the South 33rd Street intersection
- South 36th Street, from South Wakefield to South 34th
- South Columbus Street, from South 30th to South 31st

Milling and paving is a two-stage process that eliminates existing pot holes and creates a new, smooth road surface. First, temporary "NO PARKING" signs will be posted on your block displaying restrictive times and dates when the top layer of asphalt will be milled, or ground off; utilities will be adjusted and the signs removed. Second, within a two week period, the temporary "NO PARKING" signs will be posted again displaying times and dates when the street will be overlaid with two to three inches of hot-mix asphalt. The signs will be removed after the work is completed. Vehicles parked on the street in work areas will be towed.

The street repair work typically begins in April and continues through early October. A parking notice letter will be mailed to affected residents about four to six weeks before the work in our neighborhood begins. # Weed trees removed for a clearer view at King



A Fairlington resident expressed concern to the FCA about safety at the intersection of S. Wakefield and King Streets because of the overgrown shrubbery in the public right-of-way on the north side of King. Trees and shrubs obscured the line-ofsight for drivers trying to exit Fairlington and make a right turn onto westbound King—one had to pull far forward

through the crosswalk in order to get a view of King's oncoming traffic. Pedestrians, too, who were trying to cross King, found it necessary to advance into the travel lanes to check for oncoming traffic (even with a signal crossing, it's prudent to check, rather than take it on trust that drivers will stop at the red light). Because the right-of-way along King Street is owned by the City of Alexandria, the FCA contacted the city arborist's office to request that the greenery/shrubbery be cut back. 

# Help remove invasive plants from Fairlington's little forest

You can help clear invasive plants from a singular patch of woodland in Fairlington on Saturday, May 21, between 9 a.m. and noon. Join your neighbors at the stand of trees that descends from the northern boundary fence of the community center and runs along S. 32nd Road between S. Stafford and Utah—it's that little wooded hillside you've probably driven past a dozen times (hun-

dreds, maybe, if you live in the Green or the Commons). Despite warming temperatures, wear long sleeves, long pants, and gloves—poison ivy alert! If you have them, bring loppers, pruning shears, or secateurs. Look for naturalist and Fairlington Green resident Lenny Bankester, who will point out the noxious invaders and organize volunteers' efforts.

Bankester, who has just completed graduate studies in natural resource management, hatched the idea to reclaim the 32nd Road tree stand during

his daily commute. Standing at the bus stop at the corner of 32nd and S. Stafford, he found his attention drawn to the variety of birds flitting about the overgrown, untended plot of urban wilderness in front of him. A year ago, he spotted a red-bellied woodpecker at work hollowing out a nesting cavity at the top of a dead tree (despite the bird's name, red is most prominent on the head). He also

noted that warblers use the woody patch as a migrating way-station. The birds led Bankester to closer scrutiny of the habitat—a mixture of some Virginia natives like pine, locust, and mountain laurel and some not-so-welcome imports, like English ivy.

Ivy is the woodland's primary invader. Still favored as an

evergreen, ornamental ground cover by many gardeners, ivy is decried by parks and landscape managers as an aggressive garden escapee that can take over and damage a natural environment with its aggressive growth. Hugging the ground, dense, low-growing ivy blocks sunlight and smothers native plants—it also harbors mosquitoes and rodents. The treeclimbing, or "arborescent," variety of ivy can add sufficient weight to weaken and topple trees. Left unmanaged, ivy will simply crowd out other plants. Bankester began to pull the

ivy during the chill, blustery days of March and April because, at that time, it was easy to see before the spring green-up began. The pulling continues this month on Arlington's Neighborhood Day, Saturday, May 21.

### Get your FINS on—summer swim program for children 5 – 14

Fairlington FINS, "Friends Interested in Neighborhood Swimming," is an instructional and fun community-based summer swim program for children ages 5 to 14 now celebrating its 13th anniversary.

FINS will be held July 5-29, 2011. Practices are held at four south Fairlington pools (a different pool each week). Each week includes four afternoon practices Monday through Thursday; 3:30-4 p.m. (ages 5-6), 4-4:40 p.m. (ages 7-8), and 4:40-5:20 p.m. (ages 9-12). Swim meets are held on Fridays (no afternoon practice) starting at 6 p.m. and running about 1.5 hours.

Daily swim practices focus on the introduction and refinement of children's swimming skills. Bike with safety in mind

May is National Bike Month, and Friday May 20 is Arlington's bike to work day. You can find out more and pre-register for this free event at BikeArlington.com. And then brush up on the rules of the road, basic biking facts, and safety tips from Arlington County Police Department auxiliary officer Heather Hurlock:

- Cycling rule of thumb—Ride on the right and stop at the light. On the street, bike riders are subject to the same rules of the road as car drivers. You cannot stop or park your bike in a bike lane.
- More than 400 bikes were stolen in Arlington last year. If you do not use a U lock, your bike will be stolen. With simple tools, easily concealed in a back pack, bike thieves can cut through a chain or cable in 20 seconds; they can cut off a padlock in about a minute. Bus stops and Metro stops are favored locations for bike theft.
- Register your bike with the county police. (Go online to www.arlingtonva.us > Online services
   > Register your bike. Have handy the bike's serial number.) Registration is free and the ACPD decal you receive acts as a deterrent to theft. If your bike is stolen, and then found, you can reclaim it only if it has been registered.

### **Update:** More BRAC

Last month, the Bulletin reported on increasing concerns among Alexandria and Arlington neighbors over the coming of BRAC 133—the new Mark Center office complex at I-395 and Seminary Road that is set to open in September and bring an influx of more than 6,000 federal employees to the area. State and local officials have warned of a resulting traffic nightmare—a colossal back-up on the highway and gridlock on nearby surface streets. Representative James Moran (D-VA) has called on the Pentagon to hold off the relocation of defense workers to the Mark Center until traffic, transit, and road improvements are in place. One such improvement—a dedicated car-pool and bus ramp from I-395 HOV lanes to BRAC—was set back last month when the Federal Highway Administration required a more thorough environmental impact study of the ramp and what was to have been its "expedited" construction by 2014. The Virginia Department of Transportation said the \$80 million ramp project would be delayed by 18 months.

### Arlington fares well in comparison of economic stress across the country

Arlington emerges as one of the least stressed counties in the U.S., according to the Associated Press' online Web app that measures how the recession affects localities across the country. AP compiles a county's stress index by measuring the combined impacts of unemployment, foreclosures, and bankruptcies. Updated monthly, the stress index snapshot from March 2011 shows Arlington County's overall stress index as 4.79%; unemployment was 4.1%, and foreclosures were 0.36%. That compares quite favorably to the economic distress experienced by residents of, say, Montmorency County, Michigan (stress index of 22.54%, with unemployment at 21%) or Yuma County, Arizona (stress index 25.33%, unemployment 23.2%). The app's interactive map contains monthly data since the onset of the recession in December 2007 (to roll over the smaller counties of the eastern states, it helps to use the map's zoom and grab-and-pan features). #### Crime rate drops in Arlington

Arlington County's overall crime rate dropped 7.6 percent in 2010, the Arlington County Police Department announced last month. There were fewer homicides, robberies, burglaries, and aggravated assaults, crime statistics show. Index crimes—homicides, forcible rapes, robberies, aggravated assaults, arsons, burglaries, larcenies and vehicle thefts—are the eight categories generally used by law enforcement as a standardized measure of the incidence of crime. In Arlington arsons are investigated by the Fire Marshal and are not reported by the Police Department. Arlington's crime rate has stayed historically low the past several years, even during the economic downturn. 



# DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



### Gardening FAQs—answered

Every day, I receive questions from students, customers, and readers of the *Bulletin*. Here's a sampling that may be of interest:

What are low-maintenance plants? Maintenance means work, and if you don't have the time, you need plants that require minimal pruning and watering and don't shed their leaves. Blue rug, blue star or blue Pacific junipers are drought-tolerant and evergreen—or ever-"blue." They grow six to twelve inches tall with equal spread, although Blue rug has "arms" that crawl.

#### What plants provide fragrance?

Many, but here are a few: Daphne odora is a flowering evergreen that grows two feet tall with a similar spread. It takes sun or shade. Gardenia has vivid white blooms with a strong scent. It is a small shrub (two feet by two feet) and grows in sun or part shade. Sometimes in winter it needs a burlap wrap to ward off ice on the branches. Honeysuckle is a flowering vine that blooms from early summer to December. It has soft stems that ramble onto trellises or fences. Sweet Box is a flowering evergreen that shows white blossoms in February. It only grows 20 inches tall with a 15-inch spread. Pieris grows three feet by three feet, is evergreen, and has white, bell-shaped flowers from mid-March to mid-May.

**What is a ground cover?** It's an accent to shrubs. Typical ground covers are 12 inches tall with a similar

spread and usually evergreen. They can line the edge of your patio or be planted in clusters of three or more. Examples are skimmia, liriope, coral bells, lenten rose, crimson pygmy barberry, heather, azalea "Gumpo," and winter creeper euonymus.

When does a shrub need prun-

ing? Usually after flowering, but every specimen has a specific schedule. Online searches are helpful for pruning tips, but the list of shrubs is long, so e-mail me if you can't find an answer. Some specimens—hydrangea, for example—flower on old wood, so that radical pruning merely nullifies next season's

blooms. Therefore you have to live

with its stick-like habit in winter.

This is a matter of taste. Some are

large-chip, some are small. Others are needled or shredded. Some are dyed (orange or black). And, you can even buy rubber mulch. My favorite is Virginia Fine-Chip, since it has a cinnamon tinge and keeps its color over time. It also provides a granular-like texture over the ground.

Do I need to fertilize? It depends. I usually add acid fertilizer (one or two times a year) to evergreens like yew, holly, azalea, boxwood, rhododendron, ligustrum, and laurel. I never fertilize a specimen that is new for fear of burning fibrous roots. Instead, apply soil conditioner that is loam-like and allows new plant roots to easily maneuver.

Students were thrilled to learn about ball pythons of Africa. Learning about the mimicry adaptation of the bull snake of Texas was amazing. They were able to see a sunbeam snake from Southeast Asia that hides in wet areas and with its black scales looks like a rainbow when a light shines on it. The butterfly agama lizards from Vietnam run quickly as if they were running on water. Seeing the Australian blue-tongue skink's blue tongue stick out was beyond cool. They also learned how

the Nelson's milk snake got its name. The biggest hit was the Colombian red-tail boa from South America that weighed 50 pounds. It took a lot of kindergarten kids to hold all of that. Students had a truly "hands-on" experience. What a fun and unique way to learn about habitats, adaptations, ecosystems. Most of all, they learned to value and respect nature. —Anne Sywilok


