Nearby developments move forward, slowly

Fairlington residents listened with interest to FCA board members' update reports on various local-area real estate construction projects at the April 11 FCA meeting. Board members summarized new facts that had surfaced since the special real estate information meeting held in November last year.

Walmart: Nothing new has been heard about Walmart's rumored desire to build an urban-footprint store in the Shirlington area. Instead, Bryan Pettigrew pointed to published reports indicating that Walmart seems focused on construction projects planned for the District and Maryland.

B/K/Q: Plans from Alexandria's Department of Transportation and Environmental Services call for building additional left-turn lanes at the B/K/Q intersection (Braddock Road, King Street, and Quaker Lane). Jacob Gelbaum reviewed what is currently planned as the timeline for construction: There will be another public meeting in March 2013 when about 50 percent of the design study should be completed; the entire plan should be completed by 2014; construction would begin in January 2015; and construction would take about a year. A stop light controlling the Bradlee entrance and enhanced bus stops along the service road are improvements that might occur before the start of major road construction.

Shirlington: Shirlington is looking forward to the opening of three new restaurants—Pizzaiolo, a Vietnamese restaurant, and a Middle Eastern restaurant—and there are preliminary talks about constructing a CaBi bike-share station there. Carol Dabbs renewed the point that Shirlington's several garages offer more parking than one might at first think—and space is particularly plentiful at night and on weekends. One cautionary note: Limits are strictly enforced by parking patrols that run throughout the night; violating cars will be towed.

King at Beauregard: Alexandria's long-discussed improvements for the bottleneck intersection of King Street at Beauregard involve the widening of the stretch of King between S. 28th Street to the east and Dawes Avenue to the west, which will improve through-traffic flow on King as well as improve pedestrian safety. Ed Hilz reported that the city is currently acquiring necessary rights-of-way, which should be concluded this summer—no land in Arlington is involved. Utilities relocation will follow this fall; construction could start in the summer or fall of 2013; and the project would take about a year to complete.

BRAC-133: Fairlington residents continue to watch for neighborhood impacts on traffic and parking due to the opening of the U.S. Army Headquarters building at the Mark Center on Seminary Road at I-395. Mark Jones noted that about 4,000 of the anticipated 6,400 new employees now are in place, and shuttle buses are running to the HQ building from King, Franconia, and Pentagon Metro stations. The flyover ramp, designed to provide dedicated entry/access to the building's garages, is scheduled to begin construction in 2014.

Safeway: Fairlington resident and Safeway real estate manager Avis Black reported that the project to build a new Safeway on the King Street site is on schedule and on track with all approvals. It may be this fall when the current store is closed and demolition and re-construction begins, with the project to be completed within a year. A nearby, temporary pharmacy facility is still being sought. Closer to the time of the store closing, Safeway representatives will hold a public meeting to provide additional information.

Paving work begins soon



County work crews from the Department of Environmental Services' Water, Sewer, Streets Bureau, will be milling and paving some Fairlington streets, and other streets nearby, possibly this month and next. The scheduled preventive maintenance program for streets across Arlington starts in mid-March and concludes in November every year. Fairlington residents will be notified by a flyer mailed to every affected address before work begins on the following streets:

- S. 31st Street from Abingdon to Campbell Avenue (Village at Shirlington)
- S. 33rd Street from Quaker Lane to S. Stafford Street
- S. Stafford Street from S. 33rd Street to S. 34th Street
- S. Taylor Street from King Street to S. 36th Street (across from entrance to Bradlee)

Quaker Lane (west side) from the Shirlington traffic circle to King Street

The work is done in phases, as follows: 1. concrete curb/gutter and sidewalk repairs; 2. street milling; 3. utility adjustments; 4. hot-mix asphalt paving; 5. pavement marking. (There may be several days between phases.) Be sure to observe the temporary "No Parking" signs that will go up during the milling and paving operations. Once signs go up, any cars remaining on the street will be towed by the police department. Keep those "I Voted" stickers handy

Fairlington resident Libby Garvey won the March special election for the County Board seat vacated by Barbara Favola, who resigned from the board after winning a seat in the state Senate in November. Garvey will serve out the remainder of Favola's term and stand for election in November.

Special elections routinely attract fewer voters than those for state-wide or federal offices, but local media described the March 27 election as achieving a "record low" turnout. County wide, about 11.65% of active registered voters went to the polls. In Fairlington precinct (the southern half of Fairlington), the participation rate was 20%—continuing Fairlington's well-known habit for turning out a larger than average number of voters and more than in most other county precincts. Speaking of the low turnout, Arlington's elections registrar Linda Lindberg told the Washington Post: "There's been some speculation that it's election fatigue," noting that it's been a busy year for voters. There was a primary election held in August, followed by the November general election, then a Democratic county caucus in January, and a Republican presidential primary in March. Still to come: There's a June 12 primary for U.S. Senate and U.S. House seats and a November 6 general election for Congress, the County Board, and the School Board. Signs of spring at the tree stand

At the end of March, the great, brown expanse of the tree-stand on S. 32nd Street was beginning to show some green. The trees had not yet leafed out, but you could see some volunteer liriope, clumps of garlic mustard, a few opportunistic dandelions, and, despite last year's pulling efforts, some English ivy.

Concerted effort had cleared ivy from either end of the tree stand last year, leaving only a modest patch at midblock when the season closed. In March, the cleared areas stayed mostly clear. But, even when you think you've got it all, ivy is tenacious and tends to return, cautioned Lenny Bankester, the Fairlington resident and naturalist who has organized the tree stand's invasive weed-pulling efforts over the last year. "Actually, I'm surprised at how *little* ivy is left. But it's still a little early. Wait until next month, and we'll see." In addition to straggler ivy targets, watchers hope soon to see the more desirable sprouts of wildflowers that were planted: New England aster, tall swamp marigold, butterfly marigold, red columbine, Canada goldenrod, and dwarf lance-leaf coreopsis.

English ivy can choke and kill trees

Arlington's parks resource managers and Tree Stewards know that this lovely little green plant can actually strangle trees, accelerate rot, attract mosquitoes, and cause mature trees to fall down during storms because the branches are overburdened by the weight of ivy vines. They advocate protecting your trees and landscaping investments by pulling ground cover ivy and cutting ivy away from your trees:

- Use garden clippers to cut ivy at the bottom around the entire trunk of infested trees.
- Pull all ivy out of the ground around the base of the tree, making a two foot "life saver ring" around the tree.
- Once it's cut, leave ivy on the tree. Do not pull it
 off because it could strip off bark and harm the
 tree. Ivy will gradually blend into the tree bark
 after it dies back.

Don't let the soil around a young tree's roots turn to cement

Tree Stewards remind us to pay attention to watering young trees. The tree experts note that our area has received only about 65 percent of normal rainfall since the beginning of the year. In addition, there has been no snowmelt to speak of this spring, and warmer weather has caused unseasonably high evaporation rates. Thus what ground moisture exists is fast drying up.

Here's some advice to aid the survival of young trees—they need about one inch of rain a week for the first three years of life. Buy a simple rain gauge. If it hasn't rained one inch in the last week, take out the hose and let it run for several minutes around a young tree. Or buy a gator bag or ooze tub, and remember to fill it weekly. If you take the watering pledge at Casey Trees (a reforestation advocacy group in the Washington area, www.caseytrees.org), you can receive a free rain gauge and sign up for e-mail alerts about watering needs.

Fairlington FINS summer swim program 2012



Fairlington FINS (Friends Interested in Neighborhood Swimming), now celebrating its 15th anniversary, is a fun, instructional, community-based summer swim program for children ages 5 to 12.

FINS will be held for three weeks this summer, July 9 – 27. (*Note*: There will be no FINS practices or meet during the Fourth of July week. This is an important change from previous years.) Practices are held at three south Fairlington pools (a different pool each week). Each week includes four afternoon practices Monday through Thursday: 3:30 – 4 pm for 5 to 6 yrs; 4 – 4:40 pm for 7 to 8 yrs; and 4:40 – 5:20 pm for 9 to 12 yrs. Swim meets are held on Fridays (no afternoon practice) starting at 6 pm and running about one and a half hours.

Daily swim practices focus on the introduction and refinement of children's swimming skills. With the

exception of any child who is very afraid of the water or reluctant to participate, there are no swimming requirements for acceptance into the program. He/she will be in a group of 15 or more, so must be comfortable with that size class. Meets consist of two or three races for each child. Younger children can use a kickboard or noo-

dle. The meets are very informal (we do not race against other teams), and all racers receive a ribbon. Parents will be asked to help at the meets, calling the races, writing ribbons, and helping the coaches organize the races.

FINS registration forms, including a more detailed schedule and information sheet, will be available Tues-

day, May 1 via e-mail or available for pick up at the Fairlington Community Center on S. Stafford Street. For more information or registration forms, please contact Dana Andy at 571-236-1648 or theandyfamily@comcast.net. Please read carefully for registra**tion policies**: Due to the increasing popularity of FINS, there is a three-tier registration procedure. FINS registration for returning FINS participants and their eligible siblings (Fairlington residents) will be May 1 - 13. Beginning Monday, May 14, new FINS participants (Fairlington residents) can register. Beginning June 4, if there are any remaining slots, non-Fairlington residents will be allowed to register. Only 50 children will be accepted on

a first come, first-served basis. The cost for the season is \$45 per child for residents and \$50 for non-residents. You won't find more affordable swim instruction—or a more exciting community activity—anywhere!

Sign up begins Wednesday, May 23 for the Department of Parks and Recreation summer classes for children, teens, and adults: County residents may sign up online, via fax, and via mail-in registration. Resident phone and walk-in registration begins May 30. Summer classes begin Monday, June 25.

First-day registration for spring classes set a record this year. On March 14, when the process opened for county residents, more than 4,800 sign-ups were recorded—250 more than the previous record high. Of the 761 classes offered, 223 reached maximum capacity on the first day.

Constabulary notes from ACPD

 Most parents of Abingdon students will have heard about the incident at the school playground during spring break week last month. From the police report:

BRANDISHING A FIREARM, 04/04/12, 3000 block of S. Abingdon Street. On April 4 at 12:55 pm, a male juvenile subject brandished a BB gun towards children on a playground and made threatening remarks. The subject fled the scene on foot and was apprehended a short time later by police. The subject was arrested and charged with brandishing a firearm on school property.

ACPD Third District Commander Captain Brett Butler is matter-of-fact in stating that the suspect has been charged and awaits court. But he laments the juvenile's "very poor decision-making" if his intent was to have a little fun. It would not have been funny, Butler says, if an officer had seen the suspect, "because BB guns, and Airsoft and paintball guns look very much like the real thing. It could have ended very badly." In addition, he commends the bravery of the minors who came forward and reported the crime.

The charge of "brandishing" refers to pointing, holding, or brandishing a firearm [in a threatening manner]; the Virginia statute refers to brandishing a real firearm, of course, and also to any "air or gas operated weapon or object similar in appearance"—that is, the law includes "toy" guns because fake, imitation, hobby-game, and replica guns look so much like the real thing. (Federal

law mandates that there be an orange/red safety tip or muzzle plug on replica guns in order to distinguish them from real guns. Critics of the measure point out that the orange tip might not be seen by law enforcement, or it might be removed or painted over.) Brandishing is a Class 1 misdemeanor; because the Abingdon incident occurred on school property, the charge is a Class 6 felony.

 Captain Butler offers a "buyer beware" caution about door-to-door solicitors who seem to grow in number with the warmer weather—they may be selling magazines, tree trimming, or some other kind of yard work or repair.

For example, on one evening in April, Arlington police dispatch received numerous calls about aggressive magazine salesmen targeting northside residences. From the report: "Two corporations known as High Standard Inc. and Ultimate Unity Inc. transport young men from states as far away as Florida and Indiana to sell magazines door-to-door. The current group is staying at an Econolodge in Fredericksburg and is transported to Arlington in vans to blanket neighborhoods. Two salesmen smelled of marijuana and admitted smoking while selling in the county. Officers issued a total of eight summonses for soliciting without permits and business licenses." ACPD requests that you report door-to-door solicitors to police (non-emergency number, 703-558-2222) so that officers can track their whereabouts. "We like to keep tabs on them," says Captain Butler.

Weekend drivers: Help by picking up produce donated at the close of the Saturday or Sunday farmers markets.

Weekend bagging chief: Help by supervising other volunteers on weekend afternoons as they bag produce—the thousands of pounds of fresh produce donated by local farmers markets. Volunteers unload the produce from the van as it arrives, refresh and clean it, and then bag it for distribution to AFAC's 1,650 client families. Weekend supervisors would be people who are comfortable directing others and who can make a commitment of one to two times a month from May to December; training is provided. Verizon FiOS: It is unlikely in the foreseeable future that Verizon will invest in FiOS infrastructure construction in Fairlington. Kent Duffy reported that although Verizon has not publicly stated its waning interest in building FiOS in new communities of potential consumers, several tech blogs describe what is called Verizon's change of business strategy. Based on lesser revenues from FiOS than had been previously expected, commentators think, Verizon has shifted its focus away from expanding through new construction to expanding its subscriber base in areas where construction is completed.

Battery at Fairlington: Corinthian Contractors, owners of the commercial property on S. Abingdon Street near the Fairlington firehouse, continue to work with an architect on plans to redevelop the site, reported Rosiland Jordan. However, overall weakness in the economy slows progress, and no building permits have yet been pulled for the project. An optimistic schedule would see construction begin by the end of 2013. Before then, there would be various phases of plan reviews by county staff, and opportunity for neighbors to pose questions or express concerns.

DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



Your plain brown fence can host a wealth of blooms

The constant in every Fairlington patio is the fence. It dominates by enclosing a small yard or 9 x 12 foot concrete pad outlined by modest garden beds. If your patio is filled with perennials, ground cover, or annuals, the fence is even more a fixture without the natural veil of taller shrubs or dwarf trees. To soften the fence's presence, try planting a few vines on an iron or wooden trellis; tie the trellis to the fence with a sturdy piece of string. Or buy an iron tripod trellis and stand it in a corner, which will provide a multi-dimensional look.

Late spring is a good time to shop for a vine. When you do, you'll find it at the nursery tied to poles, since the branches are flimsy and have no support. Once you have it in your patio, untie the vines, remove the poles and thread each herbaceous vine through an opening in the trellis. Sometimes, you may find a vine at the nursery that's more mature and already filling out a trellis.

Some vines are deciduous, some evergreen, others annual. Before you purchase, consider what you want to achieve. Do you want an evergreen? Flowers? Fruit? Fragrance? Or an invitation for nesting birds? Here are some choices:

Carolina jessamine: The vine is evergreen and offers bright yellow, bugle-shaped flowers that appear in early April and last through spring. It can take heavy shade as well as some sun. The leaves are lanced-shape and shiny, and become purplish in winter. Translucent red fruit

forms in autumn.

Clematis: This popular choice offers lavender, white, or purple star-shaped flowers from late spring through summer. It has a subtle evergreen presence. Dieback is clumpy and can be cut back in spring. Don't cut green parts since next season's flowers form here. Be patient since clematis may have some seasons without any blooms. Clematis prefers sun but can take shade.

Honeysuckle: This familiar evergreen vine offers one of the most fragrant and longest-lasting flowers (spring to early December)—yellow flowers with white stamens or a combination of mauve and yellow.

Wisteria: This fast grower bears the thickest branch of any vine. With lavender or white flowers, the pendulous blooms show from mid-March through summer. You will see it growing wild up tall trees. Put this one on an iron trellis since this vine's branches are thick. Needs full sun.

Pyracantha: There is no other fruit show like that of the firethorn, this vine's common name. Bright orange berries (yellow in some cultivars) cover the foliage in autumn. Two-inch-long appendages grow off its branches, which ward off hawks and crows from nesting birds within the foliage. This evergreen has thick branches and needs the support of an iron trellis.

Mandevilla: The four-inch-wide flowers of this Brazilian native come in red, pink, or white, and the flowers have yellow "eyes" like a camellia. Its leaves are glossy, undulating, and shaped like mini footballs. Although an annual in our area, it's worth the expense (\$75-\$100), since it lives from mid-April until Thanksgiving. Imagine seeing this growing wild along the roadside in Rio.

Trumpet vine: Plant this in full sun and watch yellow or orangered trumpet-shaped flowers form in clumps from summer into fall. A fast grower, it will fill a trellis or façade with its abundant and flimsy toothed foliage. It is deciduous but will attract hummingbirds with long-necked floral tubes.

Climbing hydrangea: Although it's deciduous, its branches are an exfoliating rust color, and it offers white flowers (with small petals) in summer, with leaves that are fat and serrated on the edge. This one loves shade and espaliers well.

Pets left in hot cars now leave owners subject to fines and criminal charges

Each year we try to remind Fairlingtonians about the dangers of heat stress on pets—particularly dogs left in cars—in the warm summer months. Many people like to take their pets with them while they run errands. What they may not realize is that temperatures in the car can double in a very short period of time, putting pets at risk of heat stress or even death. This means that on a mild, 70-degree day, temperatures in the car can rise above 100 degrees in as little as 30 minutes—even if you crack the windows.

This year, the City of Alexandria has done something about the problem, adding a law to the city code that would impose a \$250 fine on people who leave their pets in the car when the tempera-

ture is above 70 degrees. Violators would be charged with a Class 3 misdemeanor; a Class 1 misdemeanor would be imposed if the pet suffered from heat stress as diagnosed by a vet. The law would make it easier for officials to remove pets from a hot car and for owners to be charged for any removal expenses.

Many pet owners don't realize that dogs are particularly "heat challenged," and extra care is needed in the summer to keep them safe. Humans sweat to cool off, but dogs can cool themselves only by panting and sweating through their paw pads, so it doesn't take much for them to overheat. Safe ways to enjoy the summer weather outdoors with your dog include exercising early in the morning or later in the evening, sticking to shady routes, bringing water for your dog, keeping your dog's fur trimmed, or even getting a kiddie pool. Whatever you do, never force your dog to exercise if it seems too hot or tired.




On warm days, dogs will be happier and safer at home than they would be in a sweltering car.

Signs of heatstroke include restlessness, excessive thirst, heavy panting, lethargy, lack of appetite, dark tongue, rapid heartbeat, fever, vomiting, or lack of coordination. If your dog displays these signs, get it into the shade immediately and call your vet. Lower your dog's body temperature gradually by giving it water; applying a cold towel or ice pack to the head, neck, and chest; or immersing it in lukewarm (not cold) water.

What can you do if you see a dog locked in a car on a hot day? One option is to take down the car's information and try to locate the owner in a nearby shop. Or call the local animal welfare authorities (Alexandria, 703-838-4774; Arlington, 703-931-9241) or the police to report

your concerns. Play it safe for the rest of the summer and keep your pets safe and cool—at home, while you run errands, or together while you enjoy outside activities on a hot day.

The Co-op works on a card system, where each member starts out with 15 one-hour cards and can use them to pay for sits. Sits may be requested during the day, evenings or weekends. During the day children are normally brought to the sitter's house, and in the evenings the sitter usually comes to the children's house; however, different arrangements may be made. The Co-op holds quarterly social events where children play together, parents converse, and
