## Fairlington's second outdoor movie to be held May 4

After being rained out twice last year, the Fairlington Citizens Association (FCA) will host its second free outdoor movie night to encourage Fairlington residents to get out and enjoy the company of their community. Taking advantage of the neighborhood's lovely facilities, a large screen will be set up behind the Fairlington Community Center on Saturday, May 4.

Residents are invited to bring blankets, chairs, and their favorite theatre snacks to set up a picnic on the FCC field and enjoy a viewing of "Moana" under the stars. The movie is set to begin at sundown (around 8 pm), but those attending are encouraged to come early to set up and visit with friends and neighbors. Please



note that alcoholic beverages are not permitted on FCC grounds.

Though there are floodlights behind the FCC, the further reaches of the field will be much darker when the movie ends around 9:50 pm. Residents are encouraged to bring flashlights, camping lanterns, or phones equipped with flashlight settings to navigate their way home after the show.

There is plenty of space to set up with friends and family, and additional trash and recycling bins will be provided for your convenience. As those who have attended other outdoor movie showings can attest, bug spray is always a good idea. Subtitles will be provided throughout the film, which is approximately 113 minutes long.

Though we are hoping for a beautiful May evening, there is always a chance that such an event will have to be rescheduled because of inclement weather. In the event of cancellation, an announcement will be made on the FCA website and Facebook page. A make-up date will then be announced in the *All Fairlington Bulletin*.

FCA is looking forward to sponsoring this event, and celebrating the start of summer with our neighbors in Fairlington. We hope to see you there!

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

FCA searches for ways to better connect with you, support the neighborhood groups you participate in, and enhance the value of living in Fairlington.

Many of you have told us you would like easier access to FCA meetings, so last month for the first time we live streamed our program on Facebook. We had an average of 30-40 people online throughout the presentations by the Arlington police and the Alexandria stormwater management staff. Our plan is to live stream all of our future special presentations. And we are hoping to also support real-time online questions and then archive the videos on our website.

Almost 200 hundred of you responded to our earlier online survey, and the FCA Board will discuss the survey results at our May meeting. Thank you for your ideas.

One finding that surprised me is the widespread interest in seeing us boost a focus on the arts. Over half of the respondents recommended engaging with the Arlington Arts Center. "Consider looking at what Crystal City is doing with public spaces and art," one response suggested. We'll be thinking about how we can incorporate this interest into our workplan.

The survey responses identified a number of new and continuing activities for FCA to sponsor—home improvement information, gardening and plant seminars, kid-friendly events, activities that bring the community together.

May overflows with these. On May 4 we are collaborating with Arlington County in a ribbon-cutting at the newly renovated Fairlington playground. The playground is winning rave reviews and drawing hundreds of kids. It's become a de facto community gathering place.

Later that day we'll bring back our free Family Movie Night on the field behind the community center. We got rained out twice last year, but turnout in 2017 showed that you like this event.

The Fairlington Farmers Market returns for another season on May 5. FCA helped launch the market and continues to be a financial supporter. The market's customer base has grown every year.

May 11 brings two more community activities: a plant "walking seminar" led by Fairlington Master Gardeners and the popular biennial Home & Garden Tour, presented by the Fairlington Historical Society.

We hope you'll take advantage of these opportunities and continue to share your thoughts about how FCA can add value to life in Fairlington.

#### Renovated playground ribbon-cutting ceremony set for May 4

Mark your calendars— the FCA and Arlington's Department of Parks and Recreation invite you to celebrate the newly renovated playground on Saturday, May 4, at 11 am. The event is appropriately scheduled on Neighborhood Day. Representatives from the county, including county board members, will be in attendance along with FCA board members.

To support the event, FCA has teamed up with the county to provide face painting, balloon art, and a scavenger hunt. FCA is also looking forward to debuting its new line of Fairlington t-shirts, which will be available for purchase. FCA accepts cash, checks, and most major credit cards.

In addition, FCA will provide light refreshments from the local bakery, Great Harvest. The bakery, located off Quaker Ln. in Centre Plaza, is owned by Fairlington Arbor residents Megan and Brad Hurst. #### Police report crime in Fairlington remains low

Despite several high-profile incidents in late March and early April, crime in Fairlington and the surrounding communities continues to be at a historic low, according to several members of the law enforcement community.

Captain Wayne Vincent, along with Officer Michael Keen and Officer Steve Wallace of Arlington Police Department's Community Outreach Team, spoke at the April 10 FCA meeting about the importance of being vigilant while also remembering that overall, crime in the neighborhood is down.

Since January 1 of this year, there have been eight instances of automobile crimes. (Related: see story on page 9.) Six of those vehicles had been unlocked. Officer Keen reminded people to lock their cars, and never leave extra keys in the vehicle. He went on to explain that would-be auto thieves walk through neighborhoods lifting door handles looking for an unlocked car. Often the intent is to steal sunglasses, small electronics, loose change, or even an EZ Pass transponder.

In addition to automobile crimes, there had been several instances of fraud reported, which increases around tax time. The officers reminded everyone never to give

out payment information to anyone who calls you on the phone.

Members of Arlington PD's Department of Homeland Security as well as an FBI Special Agent were also on hand to talk to residents about the incident involving stickers and posters from a white supremacist group.

Sergeant Kevin Riley, Homeland Security Supervisor of the Arlington PD said, "One time is too much for white supremacist activity." He explained there are limits as to what law enforcement can do to stop the distribution of

the stickers due to 1st Amendment protections. Other jurisdictions were hit as well, including Alexandria and Vienna.

Detective Ian Campbell, of the Arlington County Homeland Security section, explained that the flyers and stickers were distributed by an organization called Patriot Front. Patriot Front is considered a white nationalist organization, with a presence in all 50 states. According to Detective Campbell, Patriot Front wants to "return the United States to a country for white people." Their members are active on social

#### White supremacist group places posters throughout Fairlington

On the night of March 22, a number of stickers and posters appeared at locations throughout Fairlington. These stickers expressed anti-immigration sentiment and promoted a group known as Patriot Front, which has been classified as a hate group by the Southern Poverty Law Center. The stickers were placed on stop signs and bus shelters and included language and imagery typically associated with neo-Nazi organizations, including fasces.

A Fairlington resident was out walking his dog when he noticed the stickers at various locations around the neighborhood. He brought the incident to the attention of many concerned neighbors. Other communities in northern Virginia have reported seeing the stickers, including other parts of Arlington, Alexandria, and Reston. The stickers that were distributed in Reston resulted in two men being arrested.

The stickers in Fairlington were reported to the Arlington police. Members of both local and federal law enforcement were on hand at the April 10 meeting of the FCA to discuss the incident in detail (see related article above). They encouraged residents to report instances of hate group activity in the neighborhood.

#### Car thefts, accidents, disrupt Fairlington

Two separate incidents in late March and early April have brought the issue of crime to the attention of many Fairlingtonians.

The first incident took place late on the night of March 30 and occurred on 28th St. South in Fairlington Villages, not far from the intersection of King St. and 28th St. A group of individuals driving a stolen vehicle lost control of the car and the resulting crash caused the vehicle to flip. They attempted to break in to several other cars in the area, ultimately fleeing the scene in a vehicle they stole from a Fairlington Villages parking lot. The attempted break-ins resulted in damage to a number of vehicles, including a driver's side car window that was smashed by a log.

Fairlington Villages resident Kathleen Branch was awoken by a knock on her door by an Arlington police officer at 2:30 am on March 31. The officer was trying to determine who owned the Jeep that was broken into in front of her home. "The thieves were very brazen," Branch said. "They attempted to steal the car in front of our house around 11:30 pm, 30 feet away, when everyone's lights were on. When I opened my front door late Saturday night, the car's doors were open and interior lights were on at that time, and apparently neighbors had called to report people out front breaking into cars."

As of mid-April, the Arlington Police Department have not yet apprehended the suspects.

In a separate incident, early on the morning of April 6, a car crashed into the Columbus circle at the intersection of Columbus and South 30th St. The resulting collision caused damage to landscaping and to city street signs. Numerous residents reported hearing the crash. The Alexandria Police Department responded to the incident.



## APS Transportation meets with Abingdon parents

On April 11, Kristin Haldeman, Director of Multimodal Transportation Planning for Arlington Public Schools, met with Abingdon parents to address APS's bus transportation needs and changes that are in process. APS Transportation is seeking parental feedback through surveys and community meetings as changes are being considered and implemented.

Some of the changes being considered in the future for APS Transportation include the use of public transportation through the ART bus system, "hub"-style bus stops, as well as combining existing bus stops to increase efficiency and on-time arrival to school.

South Fairlington parents shared that there has already been a decrease from two buses to one bus each morning and afternoon with minimal impact on the students.

Coming up on Wednesday, May 8, APS celebrates Bike, Walk and Roll to School Day. Abingdon students are encouraged to ride their bicycles, walk, or scoot to school!

#### Trades Center study taking place

The Arlington County Department of Environmental Services along with Arlington Public Schools has launched a "Trades Center Optimization study." The Trades Center, located in Shirlington, borders Abingdon Elementary to the north.

The purpose of the study is to assess existing facilities at the Trades Center and to provide recommendations to enhance the site layout.

Phase I, which included a public online feedback form and interviewing key internal stakeholders, has completed. Phase II is scheduled to begin in May 2019 with the goal of providing three concept layouts based upon the Phase I findings.

County Staff from DES and APS will present about the Trades Center during the Shirlington Civic Association meeting on Monday, May 13, at the Shirlington Branch Library from 7 to 8:30 pm. All Fairlington residents are welcome to attend.

#### It's a must-see: take the Home and Garden Tour

The ninth biennial Home and Garden Tour, sponsored by the Fairlington Historical Society (FHS), will be held Saturday, May 11, from 11 am to 3 pm. This year's tour will feature ten homes in North and South Fairlington that showcase a variety of renovated town- and apartment homes.

The tour gives everyone a chance to do what we secretly all want to do—look inside our neighbors' properties to see what kinds of fabulous updates they have made. Many of the tour homes in the past have showcased unique kitchens where owners have removed walls, repositioned appliances, or built islands. Small bathrooms have been transformed into spa-like oases and tiny patios have been landscaped into beautiful outdoor sanctuaries.

The tour is a great chance for residents to get a first-hand look at finished renovation projects to gain fresh ideas and often meet the contractors who designed and executed the work. You can view examples of past tours on the FHS website, www.fairlingtonhistoricalsociety.org.

#### A look at the past

The tour is a fundraiser for the FHS, a hidden treasure within our community that carries out the important work of preserving, protecting, providing awareness for, and promoting Fairlington's history.

Organized in 2000, the FHS succeeded the Fairlington Historical Designation Committee, which had pursued and achieved Historic District status for Fairlington and placement on the Virginia Landmarks Register in December of 1998, and on the National Register of Historic Places in March of 1999.

"Receiving landmark status and historic district designation was an important achievement for Fairlington," notes FHS President Terry Placek, "one largely accomplished by volunteers who painstakingly documented each structure and architectural detail in what was the largest housing complex in the country when it was built between 1942–44."



In 2003, for Fairlington's 60th anniversary, the FHS re-published the definitive history of the community. A classic treasure of narratives and photographs, *Fairlington at 50: May 1943–May 1993*, was written by the late Catherine D. Fellows and originally published by the FCA. The book was re-issued in 2012, following Fellows' death. Order forms are available on the FHS website.

### Walter Reed construction enters final phase

## Alexandria considers improvements to King Street, other areas

The area along King St. between Quaker Ln. and I-395 could be targeted for drainage and landscaping improvements under plans being developed by the City of Alexandria, according to a presentation by city staff at FCA's April 10 meeting. The area under consideration includes the drainage ditch between King St. and the access road next to the Bradlee shopping center.

The city is developing a list of priority right-of-way (ROW) projects for the next phase of stormwater management work, with a decision on selected locations expected next year.

"We are currently in Phase II of a multi-phase process," Jesse Maines explained. Jesse Maines, Division Chief, Transportation and Environmental Services, Stormwater Management; and Danilo Nunez, PE, Stormwater Utility Engineer gave a presentation to the FCA to help residents understand the plans in place, both today and in the future, to mitigate stormwater and its effects.

The ROW retrofits that are currently being considered include King St. north and south of I-395 but there are others being considered as well: Braddock Rd. north and south of I-395, Edsall Rd., and Yoakum Pkwy. These locations are "on the list" for projects that they would like to implement as they proceed with the prioritization stage. Maines encouraged residents to stay in touch as the process goes on so that the city knows what residents want and whether they want the projects at these locations.

The ROW retrofits will include features such as sidewalk bioretensions to filter impervious runoff. The process is part of a multi-year effort to eliminate standing water and improve the water quality of the Chesapeake Bay. This is achieved through a combination of ecological innovation and urban redesign.

Maines explained that during the first phase they utilized Green Infrastructure Techniques such as regional pond retrofits and urban stream restoration in order to mimic natural hydrology and provide co-benefits to the community, such as recreation and beautification.

As part of the Chesapeake Bay watershed, Alexandria is compelled by the Federal Clean Water Act to clean up stormwater runoff in order to improve the water quality of the Chesapeake Bay. In particular, in 2010 the EPA established something called the Total Maximum Daily Load—a pollution budget that localities must stick to in order to comply with federal law.

Once these projects are completed, natural plants and trees hold soil in place, prevent erosion and provide other ecological benefits such as attracting pollinators. At the same time, these projects are "scrubbing" the stormwater runoff of pollutants that might otherwise end up flowing into the Potomac River and ultimately into the Cheasapeake Bay.

Applications to have an absentee ballot mailed to you must be received by 5 pm on Tuesday, June 4, and ballots must be returned and received by 7 pm on Tuesday, June 11. In-person absentee voting runs from Friday, April 26, to 5 pm on Saturday, June 8, at Courthouse Plaza, 2100 Clarendon Blvd., Suite 320, for Arlington voters and the Office of Voter Registration and Elections, 132 North Royal Street, Suite 100, for Alexandria voters.

media and in activities like the "stickering" that took place in Fairlington.

Agent Lindsay Coulter of the FBI said that whether or not you believe that something rises to the level of a hate crime, it should still be reported and that the FBI takes it very seriously. She said the FBI can decide at what level it needs to be investigated and potentially prosecuted.

Fairlington Villages resident Greg Mitchell attended the briefing in order to get more information about the stickers placed by the white supremacist group. "I think the police provided valuable information to the community," said Mitchell. "We expressed our concern and they took those concerns very seriously."

All the law enforcement personnel encouraged everyone to promptly report anything they witness taking place in the neighborhood. To report information about a crime that has already taken place, contact the non-emergency numbers for Arlington or Alexandria. To report a crime in progress, call 911.

#### Protect yourself and your family from mosquitoes

Joan McIntyre, Extension Master Gardener and President, Master Gardeners of Northern Virginia (MGNV), talked to Fairlington residents about protecting themselves and their families from mosquitoes and ticks. The FCA co-sponsored the April 9 presentation by the Virginia Cooperative Extension, MGNV, and Arlington Regional Master Naturalists. Approximately 30 Fairlington residents attended.

McIntyre talked first about the precipitous worldwide decline in insects and the animals that depend on them: North America has more than a billion fewer birds than 40 years ago, with dozens of bird species losing more than 50% of their populations between 1970 and 2014. Using mosquito and tick sprays kill many other insects. There are better strategies.

Beginning in late spring, females bite for a blood meal (only females bite), lay eggs in temporary bodies of water, like bird baths, saucers under potted plants, rain in toys left outside, kiddie pools, clogged rain gutters, corrugated drain pipes at the ends of downspouts, open trash bins and water bowls for pets—anywhere even a capful of water stands for more than 7 days. Eggs hatch in 2–3 days, adults appear 7–10 days later and the cycle starts again. Mosquitoes live up to 3 months.

To control mosquitos, drain standing water at least every 7 days. Using BTi (the active ingredient in Mosquito Dunks and Bits), which is selective and kills mosquito larvae without harming other wildlife, is effective. Wear long sleeves and pants and use repellent (25%–30% DEET, 20% Picaridin, oil of Eucalyptus, or IR-3535[Merck 3535]). A fan can help keep mosquitoes at bay. Mosqui-

tos breed in English ivy and dense groundcovers; these should be removed.

Spraying is less effective: it kills the adults it hits, but not adults out of spray range or hiding under dense ground-covers, and there isn't a residual effect. Ingredients are toxic to other insects and in some cases animals. If you must use a pesticide spraying service, ensure they are VDACS licensed, ask for strategies that include integrated pest management and not just adulticides, and ask about staff training in IPM and mosquito control.

Property managers should ensure gutters, downspouts and drainpipes drain well, that water doesn't accumulate on flat roofs, and ivy and similar groundcovers are eliminated.

What doesn't work: bug zappers, spraying Listerine, wearing dryer sheets, VapoRub or vanilla, wristbands, ultrasonic devices, plants marketed as mosquito repellent, propane driven  ${\rm CO_2}$  emitters, bats or purple martins (mosquitoes make up just 1%–3% of their diets), or eating garlic.

An audience member asked a question about the effectiveness of Skin So Soft from Avon. The answer was yes, it works, as the active ingredient is Merck 3535, which is mentioned above.

#### **Annual Street Paving**

As part of its preventive maintenance program, Arlington County's paving season will run through October 2019, weather permitting.

Fairlington streets scheduled for paving in South Fairlington are S. 35th St. and Wakefield Circle. In North Fairlington, scheduled streets include S. 27th Rd., S. 30th Rd., S. 31st Rd., S. Woodrow St., and parts of S. 29th St. and S. Buchanan St. The work will be final paving as initial work was done on these streets last year.

A notice will be distributed to each residential address that will be affected by the project to notify them their street has been selected for paving. In addition, "No Parking" signs will be posted 24 to 48 hours prior to the start of operations. The county will try to reduce the number of disruptions such as traffic detours, no parking on the streets, noise, and dust.



#### E-Scooters in Fairlington

Have you noticed all the scooters either being ridden or parked throughout Fairlington and Arlington County?

Arlington County has a nine-month contract, starting this past October, to provide structure and operate Shared Mobility Devices SMDs within the county and to evaluate their impact. SMDs are considered e-scooters, e-bikes, and pedal bikes that do not require a docking station.

The county has seven specific operators (Bird, Scooter, Bolt, Jump, Lime, Lyft, Skip, and Spin) with a total of 350 e-scooter devices initially allowed for county use. If an operator can demonstrate sufficient demand for their device (an average of three plus trips per day) they can petition the county for an additional 50 devices. However, if these devices achieve less than two trips per day, the county will require the operator to reduce its fleet by 50 devices per month.

All e-scooters can be used with a company-specific app and must abide by all motor vehicle laws. The age requirement to use these devices varies by company. These devices are allowed on streets (with a speed limit of no more than 10 mph), but not on sidewalks or trails. The devices also cannot block travel lanes, driveways, fire hydrants, or bus stops.

Jim Larsen, Bureau Chief for Arlington County Commuter Services says, "I am pleased to report that the county's Shared Mobility Devices Pilot Program is going well. So far, county residents have taken over 200,000 trips with our seven approved operators of e-scooters and e-bikes since the program began in October. While there have been some growing pains with sidewalk riding and improper parking, the county is working with other Arlington agencies to educate the public on rules and regulations."

In April, the county board released the final version of

the proposed update of the Master Transportation Plan's Bicycle Element. The board is also considering a proposal to amend the MTP Map section "Arlington County Bike and Trail Network." The pilot program runs through the end of June and any county resident interested in submitting feedback can do so at mobility@arlingtova.us.

On Sunday, May 26, hundreds of motorcycles are expected to travel up I-395 in order to participate in the 32nd and final Rolling Thunder Ride for Freedom. The annual demonstration has taken place every Memorial Day weekend since 1988 and has grown to include over one million riders and spectators combined; organizers have said that due to increased security and other costs 2019 will be the last year the event will take place in Washington, D.C.

Many Fairlington residents have gathered along the Abingdon St. bridge in past years in order to cheer and wave flags as the riders travel north on the I-395 HOV lanes on their way to the Pentagon. The best time to view the most motorcycles is typically between 8:30 and 10 am; the main procession with police escort typically appears shortly after 9 am and lasts approximately 10 minutes. Schedules are subject to change; be sure to arrive early to get a good viewing spot and enjoy the final ride of this iconic area tradition.



## DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



#### Spring cleaning for your patio garden

By May 1, with the warm weather here to stay, shoppers at local nurseries could find whatever plant they wanted. Just two weeks ago, plants either hadn't arrived or were in protective coverings (faux greenhouses) to keep available plants shielded from late wintry mixes and windchill temperatures in the 20s. Annual flowers – impatiens, marigold, vinca, petunia and geranium—weren't in stock until the third week in April since these plants have fragile root systems and easily will freeze.

As you exhale from a winter that never seemed to wane, here are guidelines as you prepare your outdoors for the season.

**Soil Amendments:** Standing at the nursery display will leave you confused due to the many choices. Make it simple by purchasing soil conditioner. It's nicknamed "super fine" because of its make-up - very soft with no fertilizing agents. Plant roots are able to grow (meander and stretch out in the soil) when the surrounding mixture is loam, not the hard clumps of topsoil, marine clay or rocks. And there will be no burning of roots since there are no additives. Backfill (existing soil) can be used (to pack a root ball into the hole) if it's malleable. If not, discard it since it only inhibits plant health.

**Specimen Pruning:** This is complicated since every specimen has a particular pruning time. But for common plants, here are guidelines.

**Roses:** Prune dead growth. These brown branches can be cut at the

crotch. Also cut contorted branching. With thick gloves, pull apart these branches and prune the excess so three or four branches aren't growing around each other. Let each branch be free to grow without competition.

**Hydrangea:** Begin by gently pulling branches that appear withered and dead. They will detach almost their own. In late April, leaf buds appear on branches so you will see which branches have none. In the latter case, these may be pruned. Flowers (and leaves) form on last year's branches so a random or radical pruning never is advised.

**Azalea:** Just after their short bloom period (late April), prune branches to have the shape you desire in the

specimen. If you wait until fall to prune, you will be compromising next spring's flowers.

Crape Myrtle: There are two methods and both are effective. "Pollarding" is done in March and is a radical cut. You may have seen some trees "hacked" at eye-level. These cuts produce knobs from which many branches form. With more branches come more leaves and more flowers. However, for a natural look, don't prune the tree at all. This leaves an airy appearance with gaps between the branches.

**Ornamental Grass:** It's wispy and tall but should be cut to the ground in late November. You probably noticed these brownish "shaving brushes" in the landscape. They are so pruned to keep dieback at a minimum. If left unpruned, dead growth will fill out the habit as new, green growth appears in May – an unsightly mix.

Weed Block: The use of this fabric can be suspect for many reasons. Weed or invasive growth with thick root systems will push up and wrinkle this thin material, creating a bumpy or torn appearance in the garden. During heavy rains, mulch is more likely to erode (or slide) off this material and end up on your patio. Over time, the fabric can break down or tear. But fabric will suppress weeds as long as they have weak roots and don't grow too tall.


