Fairlingtonians, Great Harvest Bakery, and Abingdon PTA help neighbors in need

The Governor's declaration to close schools for the remainder of the year has disrupted the lives of many Fairlington families. In addition to teleworking, parents are being asked to manage their children's homeschooling and distance learning. For many families who live in Park Shirlington, Abingdon's school closure has impacted more than instruction.

Approximately 80 to 90 Abingdon students live in the Park Shirlington complex, which is part of Fairlington Citizens Association's (FCA's) service area. Most of them are eligible for free or reduced meals at school.

While APS has been providing meals daily at certain schools, Drew Elementary school (the closest site to Abingdon) is not easily accessible by foot. Given that reality, Abingdon staff, including Fairlington resident Deb Staren-Doby, and Abingdon PTA spearheaded an effort to team up with the non-profit Real Food for Kids and Bayou Bakery to distribute meals weekly to Park Shirlington families.

About 75–100 healthy plant-based meals are provided. The amount is expected to increase in the coming weeks. The initiative also provides meals to the Columbia Grove apartments off Columbia Pike where other vulnerable Abingdon families reside. The program got underway April 1.

Since then, FCA has teamed up with Abingdon PTA and Ms. Staren-Doby to expand the effort. To support that effort, a school supply and small toy/book collection was established with porch drop-off sites in North and South Fairlington.

Fairlingtonians have generously donated new and gently used items which have brought smiles to many children in Park Shirlington. Students were able to pick up school supply packets with markers, crayons, and scissors.

This is especially important for younger elementary students who do not regularly use digital learning. Margaret Dickie, Community Manager for Park Shirlington commented, "Thank you so much for supporting the families in

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we enter the second full month of stay-at-home requirements, Fairlington residents seem to be holding up remarkably well, further evidence of the

spirit that is the hallmark of our community.

"How are you doing?" is a commonly heard question, asked not as a perfunctory courtesy but as a genuine inquiry about the person's welfare.

As the days have gotten warmer, Fairlington has been teeming with kids and dogs and bikes and scooters and joggers—in the middle of the day, during the work week. I've never seen it so populated without there being a special event.

No doubt you've seen some of the sidewalk chalk art or heard about the kids' teddy bear hunt or the residents singing birthday greetings. These things speak volumes for the kind of neighborhood we live in—and how collectively we are handling the challenges of COVID-19, which has so fundamentally disrupted all of our lives.

FCA sees itself less as a sponsor of specific COVID-19 response activities than as a clearinghouse for information and activities that are sponsored by others.

We have been checking in with the Fairlington condo and homeowner association presidents to see what their associations are doing and asking if there are ways FCA can help them. We have no interest in duplicating their efforts.

Their networks are generally more robust than ours, and we've asked them to encourage residents to be aware of neighbors in need and identify at least two people who can help them in case they get sick.

We've talked with county and school leaders about how we can match up with broader county-wide efforts and how our residents can plug into some of the coordinated volunteer opportunities that exist across the county.

FCA will use its broadcast channels—Facebook, website, and listserv—to communicate information and support for the community. We see ourselves as a curator of Fairlington-centric information and assistance.

This can range from feel-good stories or a request for volunteers to useful information, such as the location of AFAC drop bins, or sharing key county and state links. It can also be an area where residents can let us know their needs (such as to get groceries or find a mask).

So check out our channels, and let us know how we can better help Fairlington respond to COVID-19.

Arlington County Democrats to hold vote by mail caucus; primary moved

The Arlington County Democratic party is holding a vote-by-mail caucus in order to determine the two school board candidates who will receive the party's endorsement in the November election. Although the caucus for school board candidates is normally conducted in-person, the party has shifted to a mail ballot in order to comply with the Governor's guidance on social distancing.

In order to participate in the caucus, which is open to any registered voter, the party must receive a request for a ballot no later than May 7. (A request must be received and not postmarked by this date.) To request a ballot, go to www.arlingtondemocrats.org/vote/school-board-caucus/ and follow the instructions or call 703.528.8588 extension 4.

Once you have received your ballot you are encouraged to complete it and return it immediately. A ballot must be received (not postmarked) by May 30 for it to be counted in the caucus.

The party has chosen a system called Instant Runoff Voting (IRV) to utilize in this caucus. Under this system, voters will rank the candidates according to preference so that there is no need for a follow-up contest to determine the top two candidates. The Arlington Democrats hope to announce the caucus results by June 9.

Statewide, Governor Ralph Northam has moved the state's primary from June 9 to June 23 to increase social

distancing an additional two weeks. The deadline to register to vote before the June primary is June 1. The deadline to request an absentee ballot is 5 pm on June 16.

GAO studies helicopter traffic

The Government Accountability Office (GAO) is studying helicopter traffic in the Fairlington area. As part of their study, in late March GAO staff interviewed FCA President Guy Land and Treasurer Ed Hilz.

According to GAO, the inquiry is looking at two main topics: What is known about helicopter operations and noise from flights in the D.C. area? To what extent have the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and helicopter operators taken action to minimize helicopter noise in the D.C. area and what other strategies exist?

Land and Hilz described frequent resident complaints about noise, the percussive effect of some helicopters, such as the Osprey, and the low altitude that the aircraft often fly.

Hilz, who has coordinated the complaints about helicopter flights in the Fairlington area for over 15 years, outlined the history of community meetings on this topic over the past ten years.

In response to GAO questions, Hilz noted that neither the FAA nor the military had reached out to Fairlington to provide information or discuss noise mitigation options.

The study was requested by Reps. Gerald Connolly and Don Beyer of Virginia, Reps. David Trone, Jamie Raskin, and Anthony Brown of Maryland, and Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton of D.C. FCA joined Rep. Beyer in hosting a forum on helicopter noise in 2018.

GAO expects to complete the study around the end of the year.

FCA supports preschool permit

The FCA Board has endorsed the renewal of the STEM Preschool permit at 3120 S. Abingdon St. The renewal is expected to be considered by the Arlington County Board at its May 16 meeting.

The permit renewal would be for the operation of both the original school and last year's expansion, with authority to serve a total of 106 students. The renewal constitutes the county board's three-year review of the original permit and one-year review of last year's expansion permit.

The expansion covered property previously occupied by the Sure Shot production company in the commercial buildings behind the old fire station.

FCA supported the initial permit as well as last year's expansion, and has worked with the school's executive director, Portia Moore, to minimize any adverse impacts on Fairlington.

At FCA's request, Moore has provided an admission preference for Fairlington families. FCA views a quality child care facility within Fairlington as a benefit to the community.

Arlington school board candidates respond to voters' questions

Although social distancing during the month of May prevents a gathering to hear the candidates in person, the FCA has asked each of the five Arlington Public School (APS) school board candidates to answer questions for the readers of the *All Fairlington Bulletin*. Here are the four questions that were posed to each of the candidates:

- 1. What are your top three policy priorities as a candidate?
- 2. A common theme among many candidates is equity. What does that mean to you and what policies would you pursue as a school board member?
- 3. APS has drawn criticism regarding capacity projections. Abingdon will be the most overcrowded elementary school despite a large renovation and expansion two years ago and Gunston is the largest middle school in the county despite this year's new boundaries. Both schools serve as Fairlington's home schools. As a school board member, what new approach would you bring to address these concerns?
- 4. Fairlington is home to many APS teachers and staff. It is considered one of the last affordable communities in the county. As a school board member, how do you see APS encouraging and retaining talented teachers to remain in Arlington?

[Editor's note: Each of the candidates was asked to adhere to a word limit both for space allowances and for fairness to all involved. Their responses are printed here without edits, corrections, or deletions.]



Cristina Diaz-Torres cristinaforarlington.com

- 1. I am a teacher and an education policy specialist. As a board member, I will focus on:
 - a. **Educators**: Support our educators with teacherdriven, evidence-based professional development and competitive compensation
 - Equity: Every decision should be made based on the promise that all students have a right to succeed

- c. **Transparent Data**: Improve our data systems to be more transparent and accessible.
- 2. Equity means every student has access to needed services that are timely and action-oriented. I use equityXdesign (eXd) as a guiding framework.
- 3. I support a collaborative framework for education governance, especially for difficult choices. This means fewer engagements that feel like "checking the box" and more that allow us to collaborate authentically.
- 4. Teachers need real agency so they can advocate for themselves and their students. I support Interest-Based Bargaining that brings educators to the table as partners and allows us to promote best practices in every school throughout Arlington.

- 1. Steven's Three Priorities
 - a. Increase teacher compensation
 - b. Equity for **every** student
 - c. Improve student mental/physical wellness
- 2. Equity and excellence in education mandates that every student is provided with consistent and appropriate access to opportunities to achieve based on their specific needs. APS needs to operate as a school system, not a system of individual schools.
- 3. Overcrowding is the consequence of incorrect projections resulting from poor data. In January 2019, APS projected 34,000+ students in 2028, but in January 2020, APS projected fewer than 31,000 students for 2028. We must use better data to guide our decisions.
- 4. APS is great because our teachers are great. Arlington used to be a leader in teacher compensation. Today, neighboring districts pay their teachers more than Arlington. We must show our appreciation for teacher dedication to our children by providing performance and cost of living increases to begin the process of correcting this disparity.

After twenty years as an educator in APS, I bring a different perspective to the table. I know what school board decisions feel like when policy hits the classroom. I understand the competing interests when setting priorities, some of which rise to the top, like the Justice Department directive for English learners (EL). Other priorities cannot lie unaddressed, such as reading instruction, and supporting special education.

My priority, after addressing EL instruction, is to bring our current site-based managed schools into alignment with the standards established by the Dept. of Teaching & Learning and the School Board for reading and intervention, and special education support. Each Elementary School needs to be using a common approach to reading literacy and intervention, offering the same services, with approved APS instructional materials. Each school must develop a plan whereby they can be inclusive, serving families with special needs. I welcome your questions.

- 1. Priorities
 - a. Equity
 - b. Long-term plan for facilities
 - c. Determine Covid-19's impact on APS.
- 2. I have a four-step plan for implementing equity throughout APS. Visit www.priddyforschoolboard.com for more details.
- 3. I would examine the six criteria (efficiency, proximity, stability, alignment, demographics and contiguity) for evaluating the school boundary process. One change I

propose, is to consolidate to four criteria (due to redundancy) and rank by order of importance, depending upon the school (e.g., elementary vs. high school). As it relates to Fairlington, my son (current 7th grader) attended Abingdon for 1st and 2nd grade so I am aware of the uniqueness of this community.

4. I have spoken with members of the County Board on initiatives for subsidized housing for teachers. As your school board member I will continue to have those conversations and work to ensure that teacher compensation is competitive with the neighboring districts.

- 1. My top three policy priorities:
 - a. APS Budget and CIP Management
 - b. Balanced Education & Career Opportunities
 - c. School Capacity
- 2. Equity is every school resourced so all students receive a quality education. Socio-economic background and ethnicity should not determine academic outcomes.
- 3. APS should build/refurbish its schools in a manner that gets ahead of potential capacity issues: i.e. build additional classrooms though the math does not state their need. Doing so provides principals flexibility in planning classroom space when their schools reach capacity.
- 4. The community's ability to properly advocate for salary and COLA increases and benefits mandates that the superintendent include them in every year's budget. APS must tie COLA increases to Social Security or another comparable measure, which better measures and determines the requested COLA increase for each budget cycle.

Advocate for the creation of an affordable housing program for APS employees.

Abingdon teacher balances distance learning and homeschooling

Kerry Abbott is in her 20th year of teaching at Abingdon. Having previously served as the school's Instructional Technology Coordinator, she is no stranger to learning on digital devices, which for Abingdon students is the iPad. The Fairlington Meadows resident is also a mom to 2nd and 4th grade Abingdon students.

The school closure for the remaining year has meant a shift in how she approaches teaching her 5th grade class. That academic grade in particular is a pivotal one, as students start to prepare for the transition to middle school. Students will miss their final few months at Abingdon, including the graduation ceremony, yearbook signing, and goodbye parties.

Up through spring break (April 3), Ms. Abbott coordinated with Prin-

cipal David Horak on how to best maintain instruction and stay connected. "He told us to be creative, reach out to our families, reach out to our students, and provide a sense of normalcy," she said.

Before returning to (virtual) classrooms on April 14, APS Department of Teaching and Learning set guidelines on what instruction should look like for the remaining academic year. Ms. Abbott commented, "I will continue to work online with students. I am still differentiating (teaching at different levels) and giving them individual feedback. Students are still being asked to think critically and participate in back and forth discussion with the teacher." She notes that group discussions as well as hands-on learning are both challenges.

Several of Ms. Abbott's students certainly miss her and are trying to make the most of the situation. After seven years as an Abingdon parent, former PTA board member Diana Funk remarked, "We've been so fortunate to have Kerry as our teacher in ordinary times, but during quarantine, we're especially grateful for her! Not only does she have the technical experience to ensure her students are able to continue learning, she also has the biggest heart. It's evident how much she misses her kids. Her videos and messages are such a wonderful way

for the kids to stay connected to her. While the whole situation stinks, we feel lucky to continue to have her presence in our lives."

Keira Nichols, a 5th grader in Ms. Abbott's class commented, "It's actually pretty good so far. Ms. Abbott already taught us on Nearpod and Seesaw so we were prepared for online schooling. What I've liked most about online schooling is that we get to Facetime with Ms. Abbott once a week and I get to see her and talk with her. But I really do miss my friends."

Ms. Abbott echoes these sentiments. "I am really missing my students and staff. There is a reason I've been there for 20 years. It's breaking my heart that I can't be there right now."

WMATA bus service update

During the WMATA budget process earlier this year, there was a discussion that included altering or eliminating a number of Metrobus routes, including several that serve Fairlington. Now it has been determined that the existing 7Y and 22A/C bus routes in Fairlington will remain unchanged this summer.

At its April budget meeting, WMATA opted to retain these routes despite earlier proposals for their cancellation. However, longer-term the 22A/22C is probably still at risk of being curtailed or modified given low ridership.

FCA will continue to engage with Arlington County on future options. (Note: due to COVID-19, further changes in the short-term are possible notwithstanding the overall decision to retain the routes.)





ABING School news



Due to the coronavirus (COVID-19), Virginia's governor Ralph Northam announced that all Virginia schools, public and private, will be closed for the remainder of the academic year. Since the closure, Arlington Public Schools (APS) teachers have used a combination of printed paper packets and online learning, through the platforms Canvas and Seesaw, to provide instructional activities for students. At Abingdon,

students in grades 3-5 have individual iPads that they are allowed to take home, which they can use for home instruction. Teachers and staff have reached out to the families of students in grades K-2 to ask what type of devices and internet connection students have access to.

APS wrote, "While virtual learning can never replace classroom instruction, teachers are providing instructional activities meant to help students maintain their skills and knowledge and prepare for what's coming next. We understand this comes with both challenges and perks as adults and students work to establish new routines."

Since most workplaces are also closed due to COVID-19, many Fairlington parents are attempting to balance assisting their children with virtual learning while at the same time working from home themselves. This can present challenges, but Garrett Sylwester, an



DOWN TO EARTH patio gardening



Tickled pink in Fairlington

For the past month, color appeared in the landscape. For maybe the past six months, the only color was green—thanks to the multitude of evergreen specimens—which drop leaves but soon replenish.

Simple walks around the block became entertaining with so many colors to admire. Forsythia was first in line with its undefined branch structure bearing yellow flowers. Up next was the Bradford pear tree, whose branches were filled with white flowers. The redbud tree featured tiny beads of neon pinkish-purple which was more evident since the blooms were precocious (showing before the tree leafed out). Later, the native dogwood appeared with its white or pink wide-open blooms. Finally, the Japanese dogwood showed with its flat, ivory flowers that lay like small handkerchiefs on the branches.

My favorite color in the landscape always has been pink. It's softer than the more vibrant yellows, reds, whites, and violets. So now, I'll talk about my favorite specimens that flower in, what else, pink.

Dianthus or cheddar pinks:

Aptly named for its buttercup-like flower and bluish foliage. Look at the outer margin of the bloom and its serrated edge. Not many specimens bear foliage that is bluish. Dianthus needs full sun and is a perennial. Try planting them in bunches so the pink flower is showier.

Weigela: Bears a tubular flower with five petals. Its throat is deep (maybe two inches long). I only have seen

two hummingbirds in the wild in my life. Once was in Seattle on Lake Washington. The other? On a weigela in a Fairlington patio. Some hybrids show flowers in pink and white. Weigela has trailing branches in a fountainous habit. It needs space since it can grow five feet tall and eight feet wide. It can tolerate full sun or a good amount of shade.

Crape myrtle: This tree flowers in pink, white, red, or lavender. Its bloom first appears in mid-June and flowers into early October. Each cultivar of the tree flowers at a different time. Try buying a dwarf crape myrtle. These grow just eight- to ten-feet tall, ideal for a patio setting. For a pink flower, look for these cultivars: hopi, caddo, pecos, or tonto.

Sand cherry: It's of the prunus genus which has many cultivars—one being the yoshino—which circles the Tidal Basin by the Jeffer-

son Memorial in Washington. The sand cherry is a smallish tree (eight feet tall with a little larger spread). It has tiny, pinkish-white flowers on branches filled with maroon foliage. It blooms early (March into April) and is one of the most beautiful small trees in the landscape.

Coral bells: This tender perennial has basal (at the bottom) foliage in shiny maroon, olive with purple veins, lime green, or apricot. But in the spring, tiny pink flowers dangle on 10-inch-long stems. This plant looks best when planted in clusters. If you have decorative stone or rocks, mix these in with this plant.

Lenten rose: This perennial is bushy with its long leaves that cluster at the base of the plant. Ivory or mauve flowers seem to hide behind the foliage during winter. The flowers can reappear during spring. Look closely at the bloom. It is an inverted bonnet with a yellow center. Down in its throat, the petal is a dark pink. But out toward the edge of each petal, that color morphs into a soft pink.

Tulip magnolia: Referred to as the "tulip tree," this ornamental flowers in early March. Sometimes, its pink petals turn brown since the tree blooms before the winter frosts have expired. Look at the same time as the star magnolia, which has white flowers with petals like one's fingers. It resembles a star the way each petal grows straight out.
